MOVED SHOTGUN AND ALL

Daniel Kuhn's Mississippi Argument Failed to Convince Commissioner Winspear.

EVICTING CITY STREET SQUATTERS

One Shanty, Defended by a Man with a Doubles Barreled Gun, Hauled Away Bodily-Another Secured a Court Injunction.

The pale miasmatic air of the south battoms came within an ace of being streaked with human blood yesterday morning, and the lack of nerve on the part of the bottom dweller was all that prevented a battle which undoubtedly would have resulted in a survival of the fittest.

For many years one Daniel Kuhn has occupied a shanty which bas had its location on Williams, at the intersection of Fourth street, in the Credit Foncier addition. Kuhn had no right or title to the land, but was a tenant at will, and never thought of paying the city a cent of rent for the use of the land, though he had been there in and out of season until the time had nearly arrived when unless the city asserted its rights be would have possession, and no one would care to make him afraid. This fact was called to the attention of the city authorities, and armed with an order of ejectment Street Commissioner Winspear started to throw Mr. Kuhn out. He found the place and the man, but the throwing out act was another thing, something that the street commisthing, something that the street commis-sioner had not considered aright. First he tried to argue the case, out the argument was wasted on the air, as the squatter was not in the least inclined to give up the pos-sessions which he held. Then three or four threats were made, but they did not scare the man who lived in the vicinity of the rank smells and the outlets of the sewers.

The city official wished for a time that he was not a city official, but he revolved the matter in his mind and at last hit upon a pian by which he thought he could perform the evicting act without bringing on a light, Up town he came and hired two teams and two busky drivers who had seen buttles and had smelled gunpowder some thirty years teiling them that he had difficult and dangerous work for them to perform. They were not anxious for the fray, but the signt of several dollars tempted them and they decided that they would take the chances. With his reinforcements, the street commis-sioner returned to the scene of action and at ones laid his plans. The men were instructed to hitch to two corners of the shanty and pull for the high lands to the west. This they did, but they had not pulled far when Mr. Kuhn appeared in the door, armed with a shotgun, and stated that he would let daylight into the next man who urged the borses to pull another pull. spear displayed his bravery. He stepped be-fore the door, the man and the gun, and in a commanding stage tone of voice said, "Shoot if you dare." This exhibition of nerve was more than

Kuhn had bargained for, and dropping his gun to the floor he quietly remarked, "I have never had the pleasure of forming your ac-I would like to ask you what nerve tonic you

The street commissioner could not see the point of the joke, and refusing to answer told his men to whip up the horses, which they did, and now the shanty rests on land that does not belong to the city of Omana.

This One Got an Injunction. The city of Omaha has been enjoined from moving the house owned and occupied by Mataj Stepanek and situated in the middle of Boulevard avenue, near Sheely station The announcement of this simple fact carries no startling information, but there are some attending circumstances which help to give the case more than the usual amount of in-

Some months ago when it was decided to was discovered that the man had planted his house in the middle of the road, and that he would not vacate, claim ing that he had resided there for more than ten years. When this information was conveyed to the city council that body declared itself, and ordained that Mr. Stepanez must go or suffer the consequences. In the mean-time the street was graded and the little but was set to one side, and all of the departments of the city government expressed considerable satisfaction, realizing that the long-looked for war was over. This, however, was a mistake, for Mr. Stepanek was only wait-

The grade of the street was completed, and when the members of the Board of t'ublie Works sent a man down to figure up the amount of earth that had been removed, the man found the house, Stepanek and his family questiv resting in the middle of the street, as in the days of long ago. Then the case was turned over to the street commissioner, with instructions to pull the house down. That gentleman served his papers and was politicly told to go to that place where the fires are alleged to nover burn low. The street commissioner was not inclined to obey the instructions and at once made all provisions for the moving of the house. He engaged his men and instructed them to be at the scene of action this morning, with guns, horses and wagons. They were there on time, but when they arrived they found Mr. Stepanek armed with an injunction from the district court. Of course the street commissioner withdrew his forces and is now resting on his arms, awaiting the decision of the court.

DAMAGED THE SERVICE.

Thursday's High Wind Played Havoc with the Fire and Telegraph Lines. The severe storm of Thursday, which raged with great fury throughout the middle and western states, rather gave Omaha the go-by. As is generally the case, the telegraph companies were the greatest sufferers.

Manager Umstead of the Western Union said

vesterday: "We are pounding away at delayed dis patches and are rapidly getting the accumu-lation of business out of the way. Yesterday afternoon and last night we were in very bad shape, but now have forty oper ators at work and by night expect to be in first class condition again. From cen-tral lowa east to Chicago all our were laid out by the high winds and the heavy, wet snow. All business in Kansas and Missouri was also delayed for the same reason. In Omaha and vicinity we experienced no particular trouble except the swinging of the wires. Our trouble here was soon located and stopped, very few wires blew down, although the wind reached a velocity of thirty-two miles per hour. Many of the railway companies' poles blew down, which not only delayed their business, but ours too. We have a good outlet to Chicago via the St. Paul road and are handling mesbut

sages as rapidly as possible." Chief Operator Waters of the Postal company said that his lines were nearly paralyzed, "Between Leavenworth and Kansas City," said the chief operator, "a string of twenty poles are down, thus cutting off our southern and southeastern wires, and from Davenport to lowa City from fifty to sixty poles with their load of wires now lie on the ground. Business with us is almost at a standstill but we will be in working shape by night.

The Telephone company experienced no severe trouble from the high wind.

Several of the fire and police alarm wires broke, but Superintendent Coulter worked his men all night and by morning every line in the city was in first class shape,
