

LINCOLN'S STREET RAILWAYS

Some Prospects of Lively Extension by Two Rival Companies

SEPARATE LINES TO BE MAINTAINED

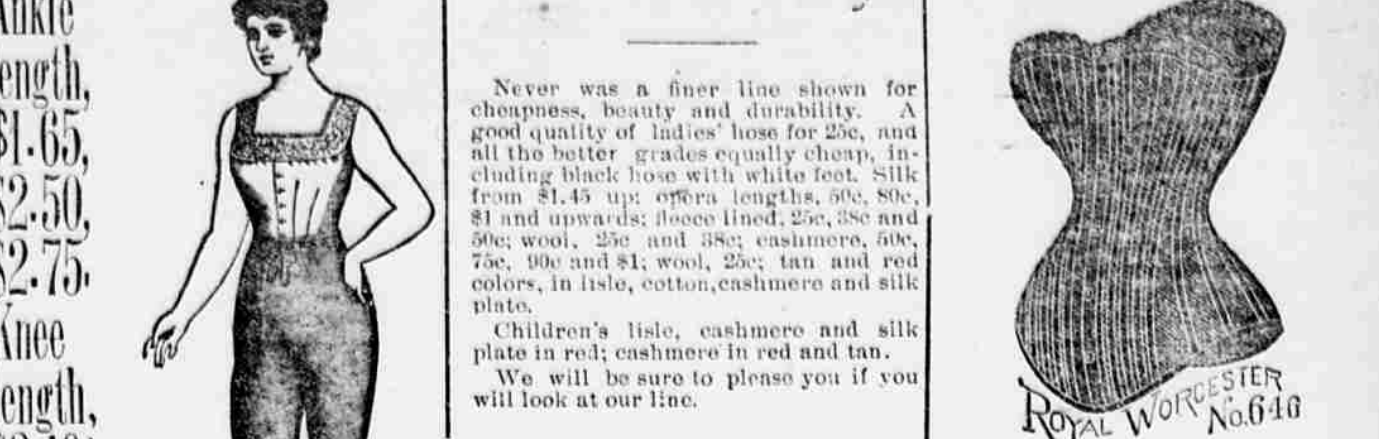
