### FROM THE OPERATORS' SIDE

How the Telegraphers' Strike on the Rock Island is Viewed by the Men.

ANGUINE OF WINNING THE FIGHT

Confidence Still Marks the Actions of the Committee-Strikers' Statement of the Situation Along the Line-The Company's Version.

Eleven striking Rock Island operators are now quartered at the Union Depot hotel and a committee is out along the line between this city and Lincoln, skirmishing for additional free boarders for that hostlery.

The operators claim that their strength and resources, which they say are constantly increasing, have never been fairly recognized. At the Union Depot hotel last night. it was alleged that the striking telegraphers have sufficient money to carry them through the winter, even though the present lavish outlay of money is continued.

The Union Depot hotel is the headquarters of the operators on the division between Omaha and Lincoln. It is claimed that the strikers have less strength on this division than on any of the others in the system covered by the strike, yet they have practically made a conquest of it. One of the striking operators, speaking for the others, but ask-ing to be spared personal credit for what he said, assured a BEE reporter last night that the telegraphers had every prospect of win-ning the fight.

#### Still Very Sanguine.

"The Rock Island people," he said, "have been diligently circulating a report during the past few days that our treasury is about exhausted and will speedily be emptied. This report has been repeated to rat' operators and the boys who are participating in the strike for a very evident purpose. By declaring that we are bankrupt, they hope declaring that we are bankrupt, they hope to make the vagrant operators they pick up chary of dealing with us, through fear of our not being able to keep our promises. On the other hand, the report is circulated to scare the boys who have joined the strike and induce them to yield to the company. The reports of this nature are wholly false. Our treasure is well filled and we have plenty of treasury is well filled and we have plenty of money to carry on the war very merrily. There is no danger of our funds giving out soon, though we are spending a great deal of money, and through our efforts are taking out more men than the company can hire and put in. The men who are capable of filling the places we have veated are in sympathy with the strike, and we have no trouble

keeping them away from the company. Of course, there are a lot of kids, who learned 'telegraphy' at business colleges, who are willing to take the jobs the company now has to offer, but they lack two qualifications, sense and experience, and are wholly incom-petent. It will take a long time before the kids can be trained and made useful, and the company will probably not have enough spare time this winter to educate an entirely new set of operators.

"At some places where the operators have quit work it has been reported that new operators have been put to work. That sounds terrible, but what does it mean? It simply means that kids have been sent there who are thoroughly useless. The point is as silent and deserted with the new operators' as when the old men quit work. This kind of talk does not alarm us. 'New operators' may be sent to certain points, but they are wooden cannon. They don't scare us and don't help the company much.

#### Paints a Gloomy Picture.

Just look at the situation on the division stronger on every other division, yet we have practically caused the line to be deserted clear to Lincoln. Of course, some men remain, but they are not sufficiently numerous to meet the needs of the company not by a good deal.

Passenger trains go over the division only a little slower than usual, as they travel on schedule time, but freight trains take from eighteen to twenty hours. It will be noticed that nearly all the regular trains are late.
"Over at Council Bluffs the yard office is

closed, and the operators have quit work at Weston and Underwood. At Neola two operators have joined the strike, and the station agent is handling the wires. They sent a man out to Neola n few days ago. He was some kid business college operator and was so incompetent that the Council Bluffs dispatchers refused to have anything to do with him and they brought him back. He was a fair sample of the 'new operators' who are to take our places. The Minden office is closed and at Shelby two operators have walked out, the agent 'doing their work.' Two

ngent doing their work.' Two men quit work at Walnut and their places have not been filled and one man is out at both Chautauqua and Avoca. All the telegraphers are out at Wyota. At Atlantic the agent is working the boards, the operators having quit, as-sisted by a kid. The kid's father is with him and both are drawing pay from the company. The father carries a shotgun and threatens to kill any wicked operator who dares approach his darling son and put bad notions in his head. The father is in grim carnest and watches the boy like a convict. Life Along the Line.

"Fifteen striking Rock Island operators are at Stuart, but they won't turn a hand, though Chief Dispatcher Linder of Des Moines is there alone and is trying to tempt them to work in all manner of ways. Mr. Linder is doing all the work himself and is having a hard time of it. Staart is a red hot union town, and everybody is in favor of the operators. Mr. Linder cats at the depot. The barbers won't shave him, and he is refused board at the hotels. He forages from the dining cars that pass his way and don't walk town much. "At Warne the operators are out. One

man quit at Anita and the agent is doing the work. Two men quit work at Adair and their places are still vacant. One man is working at Casey. He is the only old Rock Island man who refused to go out. There is a kid at Menlo who is supposed to do the work of the operator who quit there, but he don't do it.

"It is the same at Shelby. The kid there don't know enough to understand the orders sent him and is thoroughly useless.

work. They are good men, but we expect to induce them to join as before morning. An old man is at work at Richtand and Louis-

"South Bend is held down by another kid, whose father is with him. The kid is not much good. Going to South Bend he flour-ished a revolver on the train and talked about battling with striking operators. His father took the gun away from him, fearing that the youngster would hurt himself. The

old man is guarding the new operator. No violence is feared. I guess the father fears his son might be led into temptation.

"At Murdock the agent is doing all the work, and everybody is out at Alvo. The agent is working at Prairie Home. He agent is working at Prairie Home. He winds the strike at first but we induced to joined the strike at first, but was induced to go back to work by his father, a wealthy man, who scared him by a starvation talk and by declaring that he would not the young man in idleness. At Havelock the agent is loyal to the operators. He quit work, locked up and will not now even look at the passenger trains as they pass by.

### Operators Feeling Cheerful.

"All those statements are facts. The operators are holding out on all the divisions. West of Beatrice all the men went out, and the prospects of a favorable termination of the strike are improving every day. Though the strike are improving every day. Though the division between Omaha and Lincoln presents the worst showing, it can be seen that we are very strong on that division Our committee, now out on the road, is doing good work, and the offices are being emption twice as fast as they are being filled. One of the men who quit work on the Rock Island and came here to the Union Depot hotel has found work on another system. We are feeling very cheerful and are con-fident that we will win our fight. The com-pany knows that we are not so weak as the pretend to think us."

Committee Struck Some "Specials." The committee of striking operators who visited Albright, last night, for the purpose of inducing the night telegrapher to quit the services of the company, returned to Omaha about midnight and reported that the night man at that place was being guarded by two men dressed as section men whom

they have reasons to suspect are special police. They say further that the company is having its track of the entire division between here and Lincoin patrolled by special policemen, who are disguised as track walkers or section men. They declare that the company is trying to cast suspicion on the striking operators to cilcit public sym-pathy in its behalf. City Ticket Agent Rutherford of Lincoln is at Albright for some purpose which the operators could not ascertain. The committee says the company will leave nothing undone to prevent the strikers from reaching the men at work. fearing that they will persuade the operators now on duty to engage in the strike. The committee asserts that the company's ex-treme precautions indicate conscious weak-

#### Thinks the Strike a Failure.

A very different report to that of the striking operators is made by George Mer-rill, one of the cherks in the Rock Island freight office, whose knowledge of telegraphy has been called into requisition by the company at South Bend and Albright since last Saturday. He returned to Omaha yesterday morning. Mr. Merrill asserts that the strike will prove a failure, declaring the fact of his having been ordered home is evidence that the company now has more men than it needs. There are, he said some men still out in the western division but their places are being rapidly filled there being four applicants for every vacant place. Mr. Merrill thinks the men made a great mistake when the company refused to treat with a committee of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, and requested that the grievance be presented by a committee of its own employes. Mr. Merrill says the trains are not now running on schedule time but will be before the end of the week.

#### STILL UNWRUNG.

Assistant Manager Allen Says the System

is in Better Shape Than Ever, DAVENPORT, In., Dec. 13.—[Special Tele gram to THE BEE. |- Assistant General Manager Allen of the Rock Island still lingers here, though he insists this afternoon that the strike of the operators is not worth considering for the actual trouble it makes in the movement of trains. The sleet and rain west of here caused the lines to work badly Monday night and today, but it is claimed none of this trouble and the consequent delays in train movements are attributed by the officials to the strike. It is admitted that some of the new men are going out, but the number is stated to be very small, and it is claimed that all places are promptly filled. Mr. Allen is as incredulous as ever of all reports of sympathetic strikes by other classes of employes. He says the storm has made some trouble, but that otherwise the system is in better shape than ever, and that it is improving all the time. 
