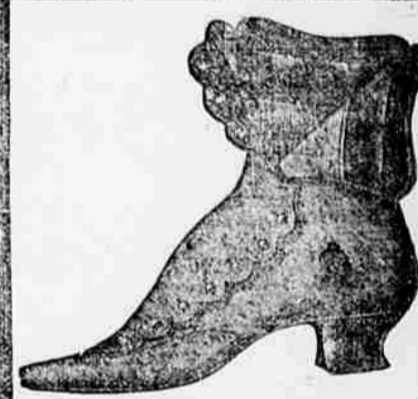

MID-WEEK SUNDAY SERVICES

Immense Congregation Listen to Evangelist Mills at the Special Meeting.

PEOPLE WHO STUMBLE AT NOONDAY

What Was Wrong in Isaiah's Time is Much More so now--Youth and Revivals--Experience of Those Present--Announcements.

There have been large audiences in Exposition hall upon many occasions, but there has probably never been such a throng as that which filled the building yesterday afternoon.

What means this eager, anxious throng? Pressing the busy street along--

Opened the meeting. It meant that the people of Omaha were interested in the Mills revival meetings and that nearly 500 business men had closed their places of business for the special purpose of permitting their employes to attend the meetings.

Mr. Mills selected the following words as his text: "We stumble at noonday as in the night."

Wandering in the Dark.

These words were written by Isaiah and they were applied to the children of Israel, the chosen people of God. The people of whom Isaiah wrote lived in the early dawn of civilization, but Isaiah undoubtedly thought they were living in the noonday. If it was a serious and sinful fault in the Israelites, living as they did, in the twilight of civilization, to stumble, how much more at fault were the people of the nineteenth century who stumbled! People were now enjoying the full light and heat of noonday, and it was a most shameful thing to see them stumble as in the night. Some people lived close enough to a church to curse them. They neglected their opportunities. Men who ought to be giants in the army of the Lord were poor, miserable weaklings because they would not do their duty. The most fearful sin that human beings could commit was the sin of ingratitude toward Jesus Christ. The first thing a sinner ought to do was to confess Christ. That was the way to begin. An open confession of Jesus Christ was the only way to get into the army of God. The man who could indulge a hope of eternal life ought to be willing to confess Jesus Christ. The evangelist pleaded eloquently and earnestly with his hearers, not to stumble at the noonday as in the night. There were those in the audience who were stumbling in the noonday. Some professed Christians were stumbling because they were not bringing their associates to Christ.

Missing a Glorious Chance. There were those in the audience who were stumbling because they were refusing to put away their sins. They were not embracing this favorable opportunity to join in with the followers of the meek and lowly Nazarene. It was an easy undertaking to begin the Christian life during great religious revivals. It was not only a good time to become a Christian, but the opportunity to become an earnest Christian was exceptionally good. The evangelist had put the question to several different bodies of Christian workers and had found that a very large proportion of earnest, successful Christian workers had made the start during the

progress of a religious revival. Among 120 divinity students at Yale college, 105 of them had enlisted in the army of the Lord during a revival. It was dangerous to allow such opportunities to drift by without making an effort to break away from sinful ways.

Here the evangelist asked all in the house who had begun to live the Christian life before they had reached the age of 20 to rise. A very large proportion of the audience arose. Mr. Mills estimated the number at 1,700. He then asked all who had begun between 20 and 30 to stand. About 175 got up. Something like fifty people had begun between 30 and 40 and about a score had begun between 40 and 50. Only one person in the vast audience had made a start in the Christian life after the age of 50.

This the evangelist held to be an evidence of the fact that it was extremely dangerous to postpone the day of repentance. He then extended the usual invitation to all who wished to start in the better life, and half a hundred men and women stood on their feet. The cards were distributed and a large number were signed and returned.

This was undoubtedly one of the most impressive meetings held since the evangelist began his work in Omaha.

Closing Meetings. There will be no meetings at Exposition hall on Saturday. The only meeting in connection with the revival services will be a prayer meeting at the Young Men's Christian association building at noon. On Sunday morning the best seats in the house will be reserved for those who have signed cards during the present revival effort. The usual afternoon and evening meetings will be held on Thursday and Friday. The last meeting of the series will be held on Sunday night.
