F. M. Bilger Not Inclined to Save His Dishonest Son.

ALL THE NOTES SAID TO BE FORGERIES

Victims of the Game Preparing to Have the Clever Bascal Captured and Returned to the City-How Some Detectives Work.

H. J. Chambers returned yesterday from Oakland, where he had an interview with F. M. Bilger, whom he tried to induce to make some kind of a settlement in order that his son, the fugitive forger, might return to Council Bluffs, should he so desire, without running the risk of being prosecuted. He found that the old man had not had an inkling of the way things were going until he informed him that he had forged several thousand dollars' worth of notes and checks and left the country. The old man broke completely down, but after a time recovered himself sufficiently to be able to talk rationally on the subject.

He strenuously denied ever having exeuted any notes in favor of his son, and proiounced all the notes bearing his name to be forgeries. He refused to make any settlement whatever, a thing which is not considered at all strange inasmuch as the man whom such a move would be designed to protect does not seem to need protection of that sort just at present. A move is on foot among the vic-tims of the young man's wiles to trace him up and bring him back for punishment, when, it is thought, the old man will possibly re-lent and settle all claims rather than see his

lent and settle all claims rather than see his son go to the penitentiary.

Mrs. Cosgrove, whose signature appears on a number of the notes, also denies ever having put it there, and, to show the impossibility of her having signed the paper, says she has been unable to write for quite a while past on account of paralysis. This statement, however, as well as that of old an Bilger, is doubted by some.

"I am of the opinion that all those signatures are genuine," said an intimate friend of Bilger and at one time a business partner of his. "I know positively that Mrs. Cosgrove has signed her name to pension papers every quarter. It is somewhat shaky, but

every quarter. It is somewhat shaky, but still clear and readable enough, and if they are forgeries I am certain that Bilger did not do the work. He was a poor penman and could not possibly have made so good an imitation of those various signatures. They are all apparently written with different pens and inks, and so good are the imitations that no one but an expert could tell them from the genuine. When I was in partner-ship with Bilger he always insisted that I do the greater part of the firm's writing, on the ground that he was so poor a writer."

In connection with this statement, it should be said that Mrs. Cosgrove's signature, as it appears on the notes, is very

irregular and uneven, like those affixed to the pension papers. There are no new de-velopments in the case so far as finding traces of the truint are concerned, and Mrs. Bilger professes the same ignorance as to his whereabouts as on the second night of his absence, last Saturday.




