

Taxing Telegraph Poles. Philadelphia Ledger. The supreme court of New York has affirmed the right of a city to tax telegraph poles erected in such city, and this decision, besides bringing a considerable sum of money into the city treasury, is likely to promote the re-moval of overhead wires from the streets. The court found that the city had authority to establish police regulations over telegraph lines, and that the ordinances passed on the subject were a reasonable exercise of the police power.
