The first session of the annual convention will be held this evening at the chapel of the State university and the association will remain in session for three days.

The university chapel was crowded to its fullest capacity this evening at the opening session. After the opening exercises, including an address of welcome and a prayer by Chancellor Carfield of the State university, the Doane College Adelphian quartet rendered the anthem, "Remember Now Thy Creator." The program was almost en-tirely musical and was highly enjoyed by the

Prof. W. E. Andrews, the retiring president of the State association, presided. The feature of the evening was the very able and eloquent address of Prof. J. L. McBryan of Tecumsch, president of the association. He spoke on "The Irrepressible Conflict," and his address was one of the best that has been delivered before a Lincoln audience for

He said in part: "Ever since our grandparents partook of the forbidden fruit, in
yonder garden, there has been waging between the powers of light and the powers of
darkness; between virtue and vice, truth
and error an irrepressible conflict. It has
been a continuous and unbroken warfare between knowledge and ignorance. This undetermined conquest must result in one of two
things: Knowledge must sooner or later establish her citadels in every home and in the
councils of the nation, or ignorance will ulticouncils of the nation, or ignorance will ulti-

councils of the nation or ignorance will ulti-mately found her dynasties world-wide.
"Reflecting upon the direful deeds of ig-norance we seem amazed. She it was that enabled Cheops to hold his hundred thou-sand slaves forty years in mighty toil to erect a single pyramid. Her customs made polygamy and polyandry respected by the ancients. She made the New Zealanders watematic forders on human fiesh. For systematic feeders on buman flesh. For 1,200 years her voice through the koran 1,200 years her voice through the koran has been winning a reverence which few Christians pay their bible. Ignorance threw innocent babes into the burning arms of Moloch. By her terrible hand perished 70,000 human beings at the dedication of the temple of Huitzilepochtli. She kindled the fires for the execution of the witches. The arch leader of her hosts is war 'where men become iron with nerves of steel,' where reason is lost and harred reigns supreme. son is lost and hatred reigns supreme.

What Has Been Accomplished.

"But out of this conflict of ages there have come virtues innumerable and these reforms are works of knowledge. She utters that sublime truth, 'All men before the law are equal.' Knowledge established the freedom of speech, of press, of worship. Knowledge smote the iron hands of Britain's power and this land of liberty was born. She broke the fetter binding 4,000,000 slaves. These evils and reforms are the landmarks that attract our attention in the study of this unparalleled con-test, and while throughout the struggle there is seen an advance, let us not be deceived. is seen an advance, let us not be deceived. The mountains of superstition are still high; the woods of error dense; the sands of infidelity wide; the sea of ignorance deep. Thermopyle, Waterloo and Appomatox must be fought again, not in the whirlwind of the charge, but in the polling booth, with that potent weapon, an intelligent ballot."

Speaking of the signs and powers of progress President McBryan attuded to the press, the Christian religion, the open bible, the common school and the home, and paid an eloquent tribute to each.

America, mighty power for good, watchful guardian of liberty, hope of the oppressed, terror of tyrants. It knows full well the sweet breath of free speech. It points out the mistakes of the masses, attacks the prejudices of the politician and the statesman, laughs at their follies, denounces their demagogy, educates their minds, en-lightens their consciences. It elects, defeats, impeaches, prosecutes, defends, judges. In this land where public opinion is king, the press is prime minister."

These two address will be in the nature of a debate upon the principles of the two great political parties. Thursday afternoon Prof. Betz instructor in physical training of the Kansas City public schools, will deliver an address upon that subject, and that evening spector James L. Herman Shiessen, the Recluse of Ellis, Was Murdered.

WHAT THE CORONER'S JURY DISCOVERED

Indications That the Victim Quarreled with a Trespasser and Received a Bullet in His Heart-No Clew

to the Slayer.

BEATRICE, Neb., Dec. 27 .- [Special Telegram to THE BEE.]-It was developed by the postmortem examination today in the case of Herman Thiessen, the recluse who was found dead in his house one mile east of Ellis last Friday evening, the bullet found in the deceased's heart a 22-calibre, while the empty pistol found discharged by his side was a 38caliber. The coroner's jury this afternoon rendered a verdict in effect that Thiessen came to his death by means of a gunshot wound through the heart, fired by some persons unknown to the jury. The presumption is that Thiessen, who was of a morose and irritable temperament, became incensed at some one crossing his premises, or who had stopped there for a drink of water, and engaged in a quarrel with him. This quarrel evidently took place at the well, for Thiessen had gone out to the well and had drawn a pail of water. This pail of water and his dipper were left at the well and were there when his dead body was found in the house. He was in the habit of always locking the door of his house when he went out and locking himself in. In this instance the door was found partly open with the key on the outside. The inference is that Thiessen and his assailant had a quarrel at the well and that Thiessen was shot there and ran into the house after his own weapon and discharged it at his assailant and then fell dead.
