DESERTED IN MID-OCEAN Captain Ferguson's Reason for Deserting the

Disabled Umbria. HAD MAIL ON BOARD AND COULD NOT WAIT

Statement From the Cunard Company's London Office Stories of Passengers and Officers of the Gallia-The Umbria Did Not Need Aid.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 .- The Queenstown correspondent of a morning paper cabled the following interview with Acting Second Officer Mills of the Gallia in reference to that vessel refusing to assist the Umbria in midocean:

"How was it, Mr. Mills, that you did not stand by the Umbria as she requested?"

asked the correspondent. "Gracious goodness, man!" he replied. How could we? No mail steamship is allowed to make such delay. We were carrying a large mail and we could only delay where the saving of life was concerned. The Umbria did not want us to take any of her passengers off. She only wanted us to stand by them. Had we done so we would have violated rules and regulations. We didn't consider the lives of the passengers on the Umbria in danger. She floated buoyantly, and the only thing we could do was to take her in tow to the nearest point. That was Halifax. Such 'a cruise would necessitate great delay to the large mail on board, which we could not submit to."

Did Not Think Her in Danger. "Did you not read the Umbria's signal when you announced you couldn't

in consequence of carrying the mails? "Yes, but what could we do under the cir-cumstances? I don't know what we should be responsible for. We felt certain that the Umbria was perfectly safe. She stated her-self that next morning her machinery would be sufficiently repaired so she could go ahead

"On December 28 at 1 p. m. we sighted a German steamship bound west. We spoke to her and requested her to bear down on the disabled Umbria, giving her at the same time the position of the Umbria. Next day we sighted a North German Lloyd steamer bound west and as she was also traveling in bound west, and as she was also traveling in the path of the Umbria no doubt was in our minds of the ship's safety." "We stood by her for about two hours and

then left her, as we were carrying the mails," said another officer. "We agree agree with Mr. Mills in saying that we would have violated rules if delayed for any other object than the saving of lives." Some of the crew were interviewed. They said the disabled ship looked light and

buoyant.

Official Record of the Meeting. The correspondent inspected the log of the Gallía and found the only meager entry: "26th, 2:40 p. m., latitude 44 ♥, longitude 47.42 ♥, spoke the Umbria; reported machinery disabled."
The passengers seemed to think nothing

about the affair. Taey had very little to say. Only two saloon passengers disem-barked here. One was Miss Thompson, living in Kingston, near Dublin. She said: "When we sighted the Umbria she had sea anchors out. After leaving I heard the cap-tain of the Gallia say he could not stand by the Umbria because he was carrying the mails and did not dare delay. He would only delay where loss of life was imminent. He also added that the Gallia's supply of coal would not warrant his taking Umbria in tow. His coal would run short."
The captain of the Gallia refused to talk until he could communicate with officials of

Statement from the Company. LONDON, Jan. 3.—The Cunard company has issued an official statement of the Gallias-Umbria incident. It states that Captain Ferguson of the Gallia, when his steamer approached the Umbria, learned from signals that her shaft was broken and that she had sustained no injury. He judged from the general surroundings that she was in no danger, and was confirmed in his judgment when he read the signal, "Ready to proceed

Captain Ferguson had to consider his own position, with the prospect of easterly weather leaving him an insufficient margin

in his coal supply.

Continuing, the report says; Captain Ferguson realized that the Umbria had been broken down since the previous Friday, yet had not about her a semblance of damage; that she was in the route of all steamers crossing to and fro and that the weather, although unfit at the moment for the transfer of passengers without great risk, showed signs of moderating, and he therefore de-cided that it was his duty to pro-ceed and inform all westbound vessels he met of the position of the Umbria. He signalled a steamer within ten hours after he left the Umbria that the latter sel was disabled and gave her the Umbria's longitude and latitude.
