DESCRIPTION OF JAY GOULD'S TOMB

"That's a queer calling," said a gentleman the other morning, as he read a story about a man who advertised for bad boys to punish at so much apiece, or so much a week, according to the work necessary: "but, come to think of it, there are many strange ways of making a dollar.

"For instance, I live out of town in a growing New York suburb; but we are a little weak yet in the way of water works. But that is remedied by old Peter, a town character, who pumps our tanks full of water twice a week. He goes the rounds of the village and is known as hand engine No. 1. He is a master hand at a fire, being chief engineer, fireman and engine combined. Once, and once only, Peter was ill, and the place missed him more than it would the doctor.'

From a little advertisement another strange business was brought to light. It ealled for clients who wanted to be awakened in the morning at any time from 2:30 till 6 o'clock. This man, it was found, had already quite a practice, but he wanted to build it up so that his son would also have a route. He said: "Some time ago I was thrown out of a

job, and, look around as hard as I could, was unable to find work at my trade. My newsman, who kindly allowed me to look over the want ads it his papers. gave me a tip one day by saying:

"I was late in getting up this morning, and it has kept me behind all day. I don't know whether my alarm clock went off or not, and I think I have got so used to it that it goes off without my hearing it. Now, if a man would only call at my door every morning it would be worth half a dollar a week to him.' "Till call you for that at any hour you

say, I replied quickly, glad to see daylight. The bargain was made there, on the spot. I awaken him at 3:30 o'clock Then I knew other men in the neighborhood who had to get up early, and before the week was over I had twelve customers at different periods from 25 to 50

'Where two men live near each other I make a reduction, and where a man has a modest job I only charge him 25

"Besides this I have transients who want to catch trains, and in summer I wake up excursion parties on the day of the excursion and the day after. The day after a holiday I am busy until 7 o'clock. I use my oldest boy, and also his brother, but the little one is hardly old enough yet." Who are your customers?"

"Milkmen, newspaper dealers, truckmen, bartenders, drivers, clerks and laborers.

"Any policemen or night watchmen?" "I wake 'em up if the roundsman is coming. Once I found a policeman sleep-ing in a storm house. He said he was watching for burglars on the other side of the street. He had just got straightened out when his roundsman appeared. But I don't charge anything for those "How much do you make?"

"I'm making about \$20 a week. I go to bed at 7 or 7:30 and get up at 2. I don't need an alarm clock, and I don't pay anybody to call me, as I wake my-self as regularly as clockwork myself. My patrons provide me with keys, and I have got the job down so fine that they tell me I never wake up anybody but the one who wants to get up. Some of my sleepers are so heavy that I lose time. When this gets too bad I demand keys to their rooms, as it would never do to let one of them oversleep himself. I never go away till the man tells me he is "How do you manage it when two or

more of your customers want to be awakened at the same time?"

That was a hard one to solve at the start, but I soon got around that by calling one a little earlier than the other, and changing around so that each got his turn at it. Some of my customers use pretty strong language, but I don't charge them anything extra for that."

This man has a monopoly of the busi-ness in a large district on the East Side, but the calling could be developed in any section of the city, and probably time a regular messenger service will be established, with uniforms and the nuisance ticks used by the district messen-

But for the fact that Jay Gould took particular pains in life to provide a resting place for his body after death, which would be inaccessible to ghouls, some of the New York newspapers have succeeded in their efforts to spring a sensation on the public. As it is, dark hints have been thrown out at frequent intervals that a plot was on foot to steal Mr. Gould's body and hold it for a ranand that the guard around the Gould massoleum in Woodland ceme-tery had been doubled in anticipation of the raid. He did his work well.
