In the stocks not having been destroyed until the statistics had been made up; however, there were other indications that the visible supply would show some increase. It was also reported that the anti-option bill would come to a vote tomorrow and was pretty sure to pass. This helped to cause weakness and resulted in a decline. Schwartz-Dupee and Pardridge led the selling. COUNTY RAILROAD TAXES.

Be Taken to Enforce Collection. The county commissioners met in adjourned session yesterday afternoon and instructed the county preasurer to arm himself with a warrant by which he might go out gunning for the Pullman Palace Car company in an attempt to collect \$5,530 of delinquent personal taxes which are due for the years 1889. 1890 and 1801. Having settled this matter, the men who look after the welfare of the county told the treasurer to do the same thing with the Belt Line Railway company and rake the sum of \$2,530 into the county's

company last year and the officials of the Missouri Pacific objected to making the payment, claiming that the Belt Line was part and parcel of the Missouri Pacific sys-tem and that the tax was paid into the state treasury under an assessment made by the state board. The county attorney held another view of the case, deciding that the Beit Line road was wholly in Douglascounty and could not be assessed by the state board, but that the assessors of Douglas county had a legal right to list it as the tax-able property of the wards through which

the track was laid. In making the protest the officials of the road had urged that the county assessment placed a double valuation upon the prop-erty, but the commissioners took the other horn of the dilemma, declaring that the state assessment was illegal and that the county assessment was the only one that

would stand the test of the law. Upon protecting the bank of the Platte river in the vicinity of the "cut off," the commissioners decided to do the work if the property owners would enter into a bond of \$2,000 that they would furnish, free of charge, all of the necessary brush and wil-lows. The bond was presented and referred.
