Wheat Ruled Strong and Closed at a Substautial Advance.

IT WAS DUE TO SPECULATIVE BUYING

First Trades in Corn Were Slightly Under the Final Quotations for Monday, but Later a Distinct Rally Occurred.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 24 .- With much to depress prices and nothing in sight to encourage buying, the wheat market ruled strong and closed at an advance of Mc after a weak opening. Corn and oats were dull but firmer and gained about he in corn and he in oats. Provisions were fairly steady and generally a little lower. The strength in wheat was due to speculative buying by a good many shorts, who had a satisfactory profit, while there was a pretty fair investment demand also. A good deal of this buying was attributed to New York operators, who are supposed to be already long. A down-turn in prices at the start was attributed to the fact that cables came easier and the local receipts were in excess of the estimates.

The receipts in the northwest were smalltwenty-six cars at Duluth and 185 at Minneapolls. This was accounted for by the late starnes. One notable feature has been the gradual narrowing of the difference between July and May, and today they came together.
