ATTEMPTS TO MUZZLE THE PRESS

The Autocrat Consents to an Appeal—Summary of Railroad Projects in the Northwestern States—Rejuvenating Dried-Up Arizona.

Various sections of the country have achieved temporary notoriety by the antics of judicial freaks. We have had justices of the peace, swollen to exploding proportions by sudden elevation to power, calmly set aside the supreme court. Others, smarting under legal restraints, have consigned constitutions to perdition and smote the atmosphere with microbial color.

California is now able to appreciate the Kansas definition of the requirements of a judge. Hon. Judge Loring of the superior court of Santa Clara county shows himself capable of rising above and beyond statutory or constitutional restrictions in maintaining his lofty notions of judicial dignity.

On the trial of a divorce case, on the 10th inst., an order was made by Judge Loring that the hearing be private, also that no publication be made of the testimony, promising punishment for contempt to any offending publisher. The San Jose Mercury secured and published a report of the testimony, and was promptly adjudged guilty of contempt. The proprietor was brought before the bar and sentenced to imprisonment and to pay a fine. Unlike other autocrats of the bench, the judge permitted an appeal and admitted the doomed to bail.
