CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 7 .- A squeeze in lard was the vision that alarmed shorts in that product today It is understood that Fairbanks and Cudahy are the big longs. They are said to have begun buying when the market was ba-low \$6.00 and have been following in the long side ever since, taking profits occasionally and settling. It was reported on good authority today that they had already realized \$700,000 profits from their transactions, with every prospect that as much more will come int their pockets before the deal is finished. It was part of the gossip that Wright, who was Cudahy's partner in the big rib deal, differed from him on lard, sold heavily while Cadaliy was buying heavily, and now finds himself short, with a big loss in prospect.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

Light Receipts, Good Quality and Strong Demand Boom Prices. OMAHA, Feb. 7.-Receipts of both cattle and hogs were surprisingly light for a Tuesday, the two days' supply showing a falling off of 4,000 cattle and 3,000 hogs as compared with receipts for Monday and Tuesday of last week. Dealers generally were very much disappointed in the receipts of cattle. There were ess than half as many here as a week ago, but the receipts made up in quality what they lacked in quantity. The general market was active and higher. Shippers started out after the cattle early on bullish reports from Chicago and local slaughterers were not at all slow. Prices ruled pretty close to a dime higher all around, the good to choice grades on which the competition was keenest on which the competition was keenest being all of 10c higher than Monday and not infrequently more. A bunch of finished 1,563-10, steers brought \$5.65, or 15c higher than anything else has brought slace Christmas. Good to choice 1,150 to 1,350-10, steers sold freely at from \$4.50 to \$5.00, while fair to pretty good 900 to 1,200-10, steers sold at from \$3.90 to \$4.40. Common to poor stuff, odds and ends, sold at from \$3.85 down to \$3.25. The general tone to the market was very The general tone to the market was very strong and there was little of any consequence unsold over the noon hour. Butchers' stuff and canners also sold fully a time higher all around. Shippers, specula-ors and slaughterers all went after the cows, and as there were only about thirty loads on sale the trade was active and soon over. Poor to prime cows and helfers sold at from \$1.75 up to \$4.00, the bulk of the fair to good stuff at around \$2.40 to \$3.19. SOUTH OMAHA AFFAIRS. City Conneilmen Nearly Frozen While

Prisoners Were Comfortable. The city fathers, at their regular monthly meeting, held in Pivonka's refrigerator Monday night, transacted business with chattering teeth and overcoats on, while the prisoners in the adjoining room toasted their shins around a redhot stove humanely provided by the city to keep the poor wretches from

freezing to death. Whether it is through negligence, false economy of fuel or an impossibility to heat the basement of the Pivonka block, the fact remains that the temperature in the council chamber ever since the same has been occupied has been too low for comfort at all hours of the day and frigidly cold early in the evenings after the fires in the furnace are permitted to burn low. It was rumored Monday night that a movement was on foot, to sublet the present police headquarters and council chamber, to one of the packing houses for a chill room and to move the city offices back to the old quarters in the Rowley block. At any rate something will be done at the next meeting of the city council. Jailer Thomas says it is impossible for anything short of a Hottentot or Laplander to remain in the police station after midnight on a cold night, and that something is going to drop lower than the temperature of the rooms over which it is his cold clammy duty to preside.

Rough on the School Children. A number of rooms on the north side of the High school building, including the High school room, were so cold Monday that it was impossible for teachers and pupils to remain and they were dismissed at noon. Memof the board at their meeting that night made the rounds of the building at the solicitation of Paul McCauley, superintendent of the buildand felt. Blackboards within a foot of radiators bearing as heavy pressure of steam as the pipes would stand were

covered with frost, and the cold north winds would flutter paper ten feet from the wall or blow a man's hat standing close window. One board remarked that he believed water would freeze if placed on a certain radiator immediately in front of a north window, and when others thrust their hands between the radiator and the wall they agreed with him. never having less than thirty pounds pressure, which is all the pipes will Of course Monday was an exceptionally cold day, with penetrating winds, but in moderate weather with cold winds t is impossible to make the rooms comfortable on the side of the building from which the winds come. It is safe to say that the window casings will be removed and the walls prepared for their replacement so as to exclude the winds before another winter. The building is a good substantial one generally speaking and the trouble mentioned is due to careless work of mechanics in plastering and finishing, which can be at a trifling cost compared with the im-
