Downward Trend in Wheat Arrested by Reports of Injurious Weather.

BROKERS WERE BUYING QUITE FREELY

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 28.-The return of unfa vorable weather for wheat and for the move-ment of corn caused the downward trend in those markets to stop. The closing prices today, compared with yesterday's, show gains of %c in wheat, We in corn and Mc in ontw. There were moderate advances in provisions, pork being 755c higher, lard 5c and ribs 10c. It was reported below the freezing point all over the winter wheat belt with a large portion of that region bare of snow. This made shorts somewhat apprehensive and there was

more disposition to cover and not much pres-It was also rumored that the members of the clique had added largely to their line on the break yesterday and a good many of their brokers were buying property freely today. This gave the market some firmness, but on free selling by Schwartz-Dupee and Baldwin-Farnum there was a gradual development of weakness, and most of the early advance was lost only to be regained, however, before the lost only to be regained, however, before the close. STOCKS AND BONDS.

Securities for the First Time in Weeks Developed Strength. New York, Feb. 28.—The stock market for the first time in weeks developed today a decidedly strong temper and material advances were scored all over the list, only one stock among the shares showing a net loss for the day, which amounted to only is per cent. The easier condition of the exchange market and the practical cessation of gold exports were the underlying cause of this change in temper, but the flay was marked by an absence of the late heavy pressure to sell and rumors of a disquieting nature, which lead to the inference that the bears have covered their shorts. Less was heard of Reading than on any day for the last two-weeks, but the stock was still the most active in the market and the transactions were large enough for

any of the late days of excitement. The news that the payments of wages had been resumed and the utterances of Judge Paxson to the effect that all obligations would be met, stimulated the demand from the shorts and the buying for that side of the account was entirely responsible for the prominence of the stock in market. It railled above 27, after selling

market. It railied above 27, after selling down to 25, but closed at 26%, with a net gain of 1% per cent. The next most prominent point in the list was Sugar Reineries, which after selling at 120 was lifted to 124 without excitement of any kind, the upward movement being steady throughout the day.

The stimulating cause for the late rise was found in the development of the fact that Mr. Haveneyer had assured a stockholder that while there would be no extra dividend declared, the common stock would be put upon a 12 percent basis. It closed only 4c lower than its best price, with a net gain of 3% per cent for the day. Distillers and Cattlefeeding and Cordage were the weak spots of the early dealings, and the first named declined 3½ to 32, the lowest price touched, but later a recovery occurred, and it closed at but a small fractional advance. Cordage pursued the same course, while Chicago Gas, General Electric and Lead were strong all the way out, the first closing with a gain of 2½ and the other about 14 percent.


