



WILL REACH THE SUPREME COURT AT ONCE No Time to Be Lost in Securing a Ruling on

the Subject of the Legality of the Grand Jury.

LINCOLN, Neb., March 3 - [Special to THE BEE]-The case against J. Dan Lauer, the indicted ex-steward of the Lincoln Insane asylum, will, according to program now arranged, be called in the district court next Monday. The county attorney has been anxious to avoid any unnecessary expense and a probable miscarriage of justice, and proposes to file a demurror to the plea in abatement filed by Lauor's attorneys, which plea sets up that the grand jury was illegally drawn, because not twenty days before the term of court began, but during a term. The court will overrule the demurrer, and the state appeal therefrom to the supreme court, which will then be asked to make a ruling on this point.
