There was a large gathering at the First Congregational church yesterday morning to greet the new pastor, Rev. John Askin, D.D. who has been called here from Kearney. Neb., where he has had a very successful pastorate, extending over a period of about eight years. The Congregational church has been very fortunate in thus securing one who has gained the reputation of being one of the strongest pulpiteers in the west. Dr. Askin had never occupied this pulpit but on one occasion before this, and so many here had not had the pleasure of hearing bim. There was naturally some curiosity felt and a little expectation that he would probably outline his proposed work in this new field. He quickly satisfied this expectancy

by a few well chosen words of introduction, in which he said that he bad not prepared any formal address along this he prepared any formal address along this he, preferring to drop into the new pastor-tle in a quiet way, standing really to receive aggressions as to the needs of the field, and low nest speedily be could equip himself to what seemed best for the church and

"One thing I want to say. Lam not omalresent. Leannot know every stranger who e calfed upon. I cannot know of every case of sickness, nor can I know of every need of this people. I shall therefore be compelled o throw myself upon your sympathy and suggestions, hoping that you will co-operate with me by freely informing me of the many things I shall need to know, and frankly ad-vising me. At some future time I may adfrees you on matters of mutual interest and

His brief introduction seemed to case the ecling of strangeness naturally noticeable in such an occasion, and which he acknowldged was shared in to some extent by him-

"It is a feeling, however, simply of strangeness of environment, and not one arising from any lack of sympathy or loving attenion, for these have already been made manifest in many ways since my arrival."

He then proceeded to preach an earnest, cloquent sermon, appropriate to Palm Sunday, choosing for his text: "I am innocent ay, choosing for his text: "I am innocent of the blood of this just person; see ye to t." He gave a very vivid word pic-ure of the historical events leading up to this utterance of Pilate as he washed his hands in symbolic expression of nnocence. A close analysis of Pilate's character was then given, disclosing his points of strength and of weakness, and impressive lessons drawn applying to the importance of each one realizing personal responsibility in staying injustice and evil. The preacher urged the necessity of doing away with the feeling of indifference and the self excuse so commonly urged that guilt alone followed

Greeting Service at Noon. After the preaching service the Sunday school met at the usual noon hour in its rooms below, where a most novel greeting service was held, especially prepared by the school as a welcome to the new paster, and a recognition of his relationship to the school. The service was in the nature of responsive readings of scriptural passages, elected with peculiar fitness for the occasion, and interspersed with appropriate music. The welcoming address was made by little Miss Genevieve Roff, who gracefully handed Dr. Askin a dainty bequet, at which signal the entire school arose, and in

various selected passages of scripture sa-luted and welcomed him.

A quartet then sang "My Prayer for Thee," and the new pastor then addressed the school in a brief, happy speech. Among the novel features of the occasion was the the novel features of the occasion was the collection and presentation of "greeting pledges." It was probably the first collection ever taken in any church in which money was barred out. This was a collection of pledges, not of dollars and cents, but of time and thought. The week previous little blanks had been distributed, to be filled out by those who so chose, pledging themselves to various kinds of service in aid of the new paster, in whatever department of religious to various kinds of service in and of the new paster, in whatever department of religious or charitable activity each might choose. The service closed with singing "God Be With Us 'Till We Meet Again," and the repetition of the Mispan.

Surprise for the Pastor. The service was printed in full very artistically and these programs formed pleasing souvcuirs for those in attendance, as they bore upon the frontispage a lifelize photogravure of the face of the new paster. The whole was a complete surprise to Dr. Askin, whose photograph had been presured innocently from a friend. Beyond the fact that the Sunday school desired his presence at a greeting service the new pastor knew nothing of the matter until he found himself facing about 200 beaming children in whose hands were fluttering his own picture.

Tavarez Almost Idle. The news from Boge today is that General Tavarez is entrenched outside that Ca tilhista stronghold and is shelling the town from the bills with several large siege guns. No general attack has been made upon the Castilhista garrison. Tavarez appears to be pursuing the same tactles he displayed when his army was encamped outside of Santa Anna. No attack was made upon that town. Tavarez assigned as his reason for halting in front of the town that he did not have a sufficient amount of arms and amununition to risk a battle. He said he was waiting for the arrival of arms from Argenting, and finally abandoned the siege and marched out, as he announced, to meet the troops who were bringing the munitions of

Tavarez then marched to Boge, and is now engaged in the more or less exciting work of them godspeed. The great desire of the human heart had been for freedom. Warring Chiefly on Women.

So far as the Castilhistas and the federals are concerned, they appear to be mainly engaged in avoiding an engagement. Many houses have been destroyed and women subjected to assaults of the most dastardly character. Stories reach me almost daily of attacks upon women and young giels which are difficult to believe. Meanwhile it is supposed that the war must end through the interference of the general government of

May Soon End the War.

The Herald's correspondent at Rivera says that a force of 1,200 troops sent down by the general government from Rio de Janeiro reached there today. These troops raise the number of soldiers of the national army now in Rio Grande do Sul to more than 5,000. They are well armed and equipped and it will not be possible for the revolutionists to hold out against them very long.

This was shown a week ago when the troops whom Tavarez left near Santa Anna fled at the approach of 300 soldiers of the national army, and the defeat of Saraiva. with a loss of 300 men, at Alegrete. In each instance the federals displayed their inability to fight the national army. With 5,000 men to face them they will not be able to prolong the war. It is believed here that Taravez will be met at Boge by a force of national troops large enough to overwhelm him and end the war here.

May Remove the Governor. It is not improbable, however, even if the re-olutionists are crushed, that the real result for which they are fighting will be obtained. They have declared all along that their only object was to overthrow the authority of Governor Castilha, who is accused of oppressing the people in a shame-

In a telegram which I have just received from Rio Janeiro the Herald's correspondent says a movement has been started there to secure the removal of Castilha. A conference was held in that city over which Admiral Salapha presided, and which was attended by a large number of senators and deputies to take action in regard to the revolution. Resolutions were adopted censuring the government for its failure to remove the ob noxious governor and thus restore tranquil lity to the state which has so long been dicturbed by revolutions. Should the government comply with the demand of the citizens who are seeking to restore peace the war may be ended without the striking of

Two Probable Complications.

The Herald's correspondent in Montevideo says that armed bands from Rio Grande do Sul have again crossed the border into Uruguay, where shots were exchanged with with a violent attack. For two or three the Uruguayan troops.

There is another ministerial crisis in Argentina. The Herald's correspondent in Buenos Ayres says that Victoria Romero is expected to resign. The trouble grows out of the consideration of the boundary treaty with Brazil. That document has not been ratified and its fate cannot now be foretold.


