LARGELY THE WORK OF THE CLIQUE

Oats Were Weak from Start to Finish and Closed After an Active Day's Business Below the Price Ruling Saturday Afternoon.

CHICAGO, DL. March 27.-May wheat jumped to S0c a hushel today, a 2-cent advance over Faturday's high mark, and closed at 70%c. The advance of le Saturday scared the shorts and they started in at the opening to cover part of their line. The market was wild, and closing quotations ranged from 78%c to 78%c. The heavy buying sent the market to 79% with a rush. Then the clique came in by sell-ing some of its holdings and the price dropped to the opening figure. The shorts then began to buy again and the market went up to the ellipse alding in the advance by taking back part of their original offerings

Receipts of all kinds were moderate, even for a Monday and some what lighter than a week ago.

NEW YORK, March 27,-A message was cabled to Mr. Gladstone last night by the National Federation of America, pledging him its support in his efforts to carry through the home rule bill and expressing alike the sentiments of the thousands who had gathered at the Academy of Music to endorse this action and the tens of thousands of Irishmen throughout America who are loyal to their motherland. This was the keynote of the great

gathering of Irishmen at the Academy of Music last evening. From the gov-ernors of almost every state in. the union came messages of sympathy with the home rule move-ment. Governor Flower of New York. in a letter, inclosing a check for \$200, said: "My sympathy with the cause of home rule has often been ex-Covernor Stone of Missour pressed." "It is a movement in the direction said: of a larger liberty and better govern-ment for Ireland." Governor Russell of Massachusetts extended his heartfelt sympathy in the movement. Governor Altgeld of Illinois wrote: "The time has come for Ireland to have home rule and I heartily favor every measure which will tend to bring it about.

Archbishop Corrigan, unable to be present, expressed, through Manager Farley, heartfelt advocacy of the principles for the promulgation of which the meeting had been called.

A dispatch to President Emmett from Justin McCarthy evoked enthusiasm. It was as follows: "We learn with grati-tude of yourself and federation to help forward the Irish movement. Effectually continue the work, you did by timely assistance at the general election. Gladstone's home rule bill will l pass the Commons, but only by the unemitting attendance of the Irish party, The movement needs the prompt and generous support of kinsmen and friends to offset the desperate efforts of wealthy and powerful enemies combined against

Ireland." After Chairman Judge John O'Brien's opening address Hon. Bourke Cockran was introduced. A sprained ankle compelled him to lean heavily on the back of a chair. Several times during his speech the entire house rose and cheered to the echo the patriotic eloquence which flowed from his lips.
