STOCKS AND BONDS.

Securities Were Less Active Yesterday Than Usual, with Lower Prices. New York, April 4.- The stock market was far less active than of late and a lower range of prices prevailed. Manhattan broke 44 points to 160% on a relteration of the reports that powerful capitalists have professed a willingness to advance the capital necessary to insure the success of an underground road provided they receive suitable concessions from the city authorities. The identity of the capitalists had not yet been divulged, but the general impression is that Austin Corbin is behind the scheme. The fact that London was a seller of stocks had a depressing effect as it induced the traders to raid the leading shares. They made a series of attacks finally concentrating their energies on Southern Pacific which scored the greatest loss, 1% to 49%.

There was a good inquiry from all sources for cattle today and with only a limited number on sale. The market was quite active and prices, as a rule, stronger. Some of the more desirable killing grades, not too heavy, sold pretty close to loc higher than Monday. The export trade is in very unsatisfactory shape, owing to the depression in European markets, and for this reason ripe, heavy cattle are not selling as well relatively as the lighter grades. This fact is not so notable nor the circumstance so felt on account of the comparatively small offerings of matured cattle. Dealers say they never saw so many half fat cattle at this time of the year. Feeders are attracted by the fact that values are a big dollar per hundred higher than a year ago, and on the principle that "a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush" are rushing their stock in as soon as there are the first signs of fat, instead of finishing and running the chance of realizing as good or even better prices in a month or two. The bulk of the offerings today were steers weighing around 1.100 to 1.200 lbs., and they sold largely at from \$4.40 to \$4.80 each a load of choice 1436-b beeves at \$5.10 for a top and poor thin stock do wn as low as \$3.75 for a bottom. About everything sold and in good season.

Lincoln Litigation Revives a Peculiar Story of Domestic Relations.

TIME DIVIDED BETWEEN TWO HUSBANDS

Nebraska Family Deserted Without Apparent Cause for a Questionable Existence In Missouri Lawyers Engage in a Street Fight.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 4 - | Special to THE Ber. | Judge Lansing today issued an order directing that the estate of the late Winnie A. Sutton be divided between her child and her former husband. The estate does not amount to much in dollars and cents, but behind the case is an interesting little story. The girl formerly resided in Lincoln, and here married McClellan. They went to housekeeping on North Fourteenth street. and apparently lived happily for some months. One evening Mrs. McClelian lussed her husband goodby and told him she was going to the grocery store on an errand, and would be back in half an hour. She had previously neglected to secure a divorce from McCollago but Sutton was measured of her McClellan, but Sutton was unaware of McClellan, but Sutton was unaware of her previous life until after her death in St Louis a little over a year ago. In her effects he found letters which indicated that she formerly lived in Lincoln, and when, last July, he baid a visit to friends at Bure. Neb., he discovered that his wife had a sister living there, and gradually he learned the entire story. He also learned that his wife's father had died a year previous and the snug little sum of \$1.500 cush was awaiting her. At first it was thought that a serious legal light would take place over the estate between the two busbands, but estate between the two busbands, but Sutton agreed to withdraw all claim to it if McClellan would agree that a daughter, which had been born to Sutton and the woman, should share the money equally with him.
