Wheat, Corn and Oats Closed Weak After Many Changes.

BEARS WERE QUITE EASILY ALARMED

July Wheat Especially Was Boomed by the Price Current's Report that Crop Damage Was Greater Than at First Supposed.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 6.—The wheat, corn and oats markets closed weak after many change s-Provisions started strong and continued to be end. Rye awakened at last to the fact that weather which had killed wheat was not unlikely to have injured tye and it accordingly had a rise of 3c per bushel.

Attorney Eli H. Doud is assisting him. Mr. Walters said to Tue Beg reporter that he proposed to "go to the ends of the earth if necessary to secure justice." He claims he was defrauded out of the mayorality at the election last Tuesday. Nobody knows exactly what the claim is based upon, but from the steps so far taken it is evident that irregularities in opening polling places and other similar in-accuracies, common to every election held since America adopted a republican form of government, are to be the basis of his com-

Mr. Walters entered City Clerk Ditzen's office and demanded that the clerk open the vault which contains the ballot boxes, also open the boxes and take therefrom the copy of the poll books which the law provides shall be retained by the chairman of each precinct board, and deliver the same to him, the election board in several instance# hav one copy for public inspection.

Day and night since the election Mr. Wal-ters has had police officers of his own choosing on guard over the boxes, with strict orders to permit no man to open the vault or monkey with the boxes, which are duly scaled according to law.
