Domestic Markets Were Easy at the Start but Finally Torned Strong, Probably Influenced by the Course of Other Markets.

CHICAGO, III., May S .- The wheat market was somewhat uncertain at the opening this morning, and in the early trading sold a shade lower than the closing price of yesterday, but the sentiment soon shifted and a decidedly firm feeling set in, with an advance of hic holding pretty firmly and steadily around the top until near the close, when there was a recession to inside figures, probably on account of the excited break in stocks in New York. July and May, however, were relatively stronger. Cables were practically lower, and advices as to weather conditions in Europe were conflicting, but the absence of any excitementor strength in European markets was pretty good evidence that the outlook was not regarded as very serious.

Domestic markets were easy at the start but finally turned strong, probably influenced by the course of other markets. The government crop and weather built in showed that the winter wheat crop was in an unpromising condition. There had been some gain in Tenn-essee, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana, but elsewhere the outlook had grown worse. The spring wheat region was in a backward condition and much of the seed sown before the late freeze-up was said to be rotting in the ground.
