THE news of the long continued drought in European grain producing districts, together with the prospect of a slightly diminished crop in this country, point to a era of higher prices for Nebraska products.

THE World's fair management has designated June 8 as Nebraska day. Now let the railroad companies give the people of this state a rate to Chicago and return which will insure a successful celebration of the day by Nebraska people.

THE Illinois legislature is about to adjourn, and as is usually the case in all similar bodies, the committee desks are stuffed with the multifarious telephone, gas and electric lighting and other corporation bills introduced in either house during the session and thus finally disposed of.

A GRAVE responsibility will rest upon Nebraska's state officials in the matter of the sale of the Saline lands as provided by the act of the last legislature.

ABOUT every day for three weeks the Washington reporter of a Lincoln paper has stated, affirmed, reiterated and insisted that Secretary Morton controls the official patronage of Nebraska.

PRESIDENT CLEVELAND complains that his time is almost entirely occupied in listening to applications for office which have been "bewildering in volume, perplexing and exhausting in their iteration and impossible of remembrance."

THE people of Nebraska care very little whether the suit against ex-State Treasurer Hill and his bondsmen is prosecuted in Douglas or Lancaster county.

CONGRESSMAN BRYAN and the other free silver patriots who are endeavoring to propagate a new species of democracy in Nebraska are receiving little countenance and less comfort from the administration.

WE hope that the question as to who, among leading democrats, has most influence at the white house, will soon be determined.

THE supervisors of San Bernardino county, California, have resorted to a novel, and what will doubtless prove a rather unpopular device, to protect the forests and water supply.

NEBRASKA DAY AT THE FAIR.

June 8 has been designated by the World's fair management as Nebraska day. Before that time the exhibit of this state will be in perfect shape and it is expected that by the beginning of next month the entire exposition will be complete and that the flood of visitors will have fully set in.

From an interview with Commissioner Garneau there appears to be every reason to expect that the Nebraska display will be highly creditable to the state, so far as agricultural products are concerned. There appears to be some doubt as to whether the live stock exhibit will be as extensive as could be desired.

Nebraska day, the commissioner says, will offer some special attractions, which will be appreciated by Nebraskans and interesting to all visitors to the fair. The program has not yet been fully arranged.

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A Boston investment company which has for years been doing business in Kansas has withdrawn its capital from that state. It is said that other companies have already followed its example.
