

WEATHER CROP BULLETINS

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Last Week's Conditions Very Favorable for the Farmer.

FARM WORK IS BEING RAPIDLY PUSHED

Heeding Reports Come from Almost Every State—Great Improvement Noticed Over Last Week's Bright Promise for Bountiful Harvests.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 16.—The week ending May 15 has been the most favorable of the season in the spring wheat region and in the states of Illinois, Mississippi and the Missouri valley, in Kansas, Indian Territory and northern Texas. The week was slightly cooler than usual from Pennsylvania and

ship outward to Florida, including the east portion of the cotton region, the cool nights being reported as unfavorable to the crop in South Carolina. The season is from week to week days late in most sections, although the cotton has been somewhat pushed during the past week in the principal grades. From telegrams to the department, giving the general condition through the United States, it is inferred that there has been a general improvement over the principal and critical sections of the cotton belt. The weather conditions were unfavorable in the east portion of the cotton regions.

Missouri's Prospects.

COLUMBIA, Mo., May 16.—The weekly crop and weather bulletin for this state, issued today, reports a temperature ranging from normal to above normal, and a deficiency in the east, central and southwestern sections. The week has been an improvement over the one preceding, with bright weather and rainfall, not varying far either way from normal.

It is still too wet for further plowing and seeding, but the amount of rain has increased the amount of replanting to be done, there is need of long continued fine weather. The condition of the crops throughout the state is generally favorable, though the brighter weather is being taken advantage of to improve them in every way possible.

Wheat is in good condition, but in no case is a normal crop promised, while in places its condition sinks below 50 per cent. Oats promise as well as anything sown and the situation is about the same.

Grasses and pasture are doing well. Potatoes have rotted some; fruits are looking better, but the outlook is still very poor. The cherries, plums, etc., are dropping badly to the ground.

Corn is in bad condition and the most of the seed has rotted, but the seed that has not rotted will have to be replanted.

Gardens are hardly started and early vegetables are improving.

Nebraska Crops Improved.

CRETE, Neb., May 16, 1916.—[Special to THE OMAHA BEAVER.]—Weather crop bulletin No. 6 of the Nebraska weather service, issued from its central office at Berkeley, California, by Darius C. Colby, director, Crete, for the week ending Tuesday, May 16, says:

Reports received from 120 observers in sixty counties.

The first half of the week was cold and cloudy, followed by warm sunshiny weather the last half, making the average for the week slightly above normal.

The rainfall over much the larger part of the state has been less than an inch, but over a large area in the southern half of the state the rain fell, being the heaviest in York and Adams counties, where it was two to two and one-half inches.

The week has been more favorable than any other in the season, and all crops show improvement in condition. All sections have been benefited by the weather of the last few days, followed by warm sunshiny weather of the last few days, which have brought all the crops up and out of the ground.

Conditions in Illinois.
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 10, 1933. The weather report bulletin for May 10 says: "The temperature for the past seven days has been below the normal in the northern division, about normal in the middle, and below normal in the southern. There has been an average amount of sunshine, but the rain has been below the average except in a few counties.
