

Grand Parade and Memorial Exercises at Syndicate Park.

RAIN STORM CUT SHORT THE ORATION

Biggest Decoration Day in Magic City Ristory-Police Detail for June-Victors Dog Attacks a Citizen-Gossip and Personals.

The streets of South Omaha were thronged with people by 9 o'clock yesterday morning and the air was full of music. The old veterans, accompanied by their wives, sens and daughters, assembled at the Grand Army of the Republic headquarters early, and at 10 o'clock started for the different cemeteries to decorate the graves of their departed loved ones. There was plenty of flowers for all of them. Only ten members of Robert Livingston post have been buried here and the majority of them were laid to rest in

Laurel Hill cemetery.

All the business houses and a great many private residences were elaborately decorated with flags and bunting and the city had the most gala appearance within its hictory.

The parade was a little late in getting started, but when it did get into shape and began to move toward Semigration.

started, but when it did get into shape and began to move toward Syndicate park it was fully a mile long. The marshals did their work well. They were J.W. Cress, William Kelley, N. E. Acker, W. S. Anderson, Jacob Jaskalek, Thomas Hoctor and S. P. Brigham. First came a platoon of police in charge of Chief Beckett, followed by the marshals and the Grand Army of the Republic drum corps. Then came the members of the Robert Livingston post and the Sons of Veterans in uniform.

The ladies of the Woman's Relief corps had a large express wagen all decorated and fixed up in a very pretty manner and rode

fixed up in a very pretty manner and rode in the procession just tehind the old sol-diers. The Daughters of Veterans attracted more attention perhaps than any other fea-ture in the parade, not only on account of their brantful faces but for their bright ture in the parade, not only on account of their beautiful faces, but for their bright,

their beautiful faces, but for their bright, new, clean and pretty costumes.

Lily division Uniformed Rank Knights of Pythias looked splendially and gave a great deal of tone to the procession.

Then came Postmaster Glasgow and the employes of the postoffice department, closely followed by the South Omaha Junior band, which furnished excellent music all along the line. T. F. Elliott and W. S. Strawn, the orator of the day, the different ministers of South Omaha, members of the city council and the city officers followed in carriages. The fire team from Hammond's had its cart draped and decora, ed in an attractive manner. Fire Chief Hammona's had its cart draped and deco-rated in an attractive manner. Fire Chief Fred Smith and Assistant Chief W. L. Hol-land headed the South Omaha fire depart-ment in the chief's wagon. The fire laddles had their apparatus beautifully decorated with flowers and flags and were admired by the immense throng that stood on either side of the street viewing the parade.

School Children in Line.

Superintendent Monroe and the teachers in the public schools turned out with a hundred or more of their pupils, who filled the air with their merry shouts and prattling voices. The Catholic schools were well represented. Father McDevitt and Father Monlagter wide in a carriage and represented. Father McDevitt and Father Moriarty rode in a carriage and headed a long procession of the children and teachers from St. Agnes school. The little ones all wore white dresses and a neat blue cap and each of them carried a small flag. It was a beautiful sight.
