

CONTRACTS OF THE TRADE

Business in a Jobbing Way Better than a Year Ago. Year Ago. MORE STRANGERS IN THE CITY THAN USUAL

Bank Clearings Show a Very Satisfactory Increase Over the Corresponding Time Last Year—Local Retail Trade Not Very Active.

It is no easy matter to satisfactorily explain the condition of Omaha's jobbing trade for the reason that there is such a wide variation in the reports made by its jobbers.

During the month of May the volume of business in excess of last year at this season. Jobbers themselves have noticed this difference in the reports and one of them remarks that it would seem that trade at the present time is spotted.

A roomy man in the jobbing trade looking over his books for the past month notices that there has been an increase as compared with the same month of last year.

Brokers who keep in pretty close touch with the jobbing trade here and there were general fears of a crop failure which kept the volume of trade down to a very low point, so that there was no real trade worth to be reported as very light.

Some of them are running their stocks down to a pretty low point and are not buying as freely as usual.

Some of the men who visit the leading cities of the west generally report that business in a jobbing way is better in Omaha than in any other western city.
