THE SITUATION IMPROVING.

Advisers from all quarters are of the effect that the financial situation is improving, and while the restoration of confidence cannot be expected to come at once there are some substantial reasons for believing that conditions will continue to grow better.

There are several other circumstances which have contributed to an improved feeling, among them a decline in the number of commercial failures during the past week and an increased foreign demand for grain.

There is a growing conviction that the worst has been experienced, and while business has received a shock it has on the whole not been so severe as was apprehended.

As already remarked, it is not to be expected that there will be an immediate restoration of confidence.

The federal grand jury at Chicago has begun an investigation of railroad management which promises to be the most thorough ever undertaken by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

It is understood that the inquiry will extend to passenger and freight business, and that it has been instituted only after a very careful and diligent study of the situation by the commissioners and Attorney General Olney.

There does not appear to be, therefore, any very substantial reasons for apprehending the repeal of the 10 per cent tax on state bank issues by the next congress.

At the beginning of the present month there was over \$300,000 of school money in the hands of the city treasurer.

Now, we cannot comprehend why Mr. Bolin should find it necessary to seek advice outside of the legal department of the city, or why he should seek to turn to his own advantage technical defects, if any do exist.
