ANOTHER CUT IN PASSENGER RATES

Calculated to Make Trouble for the Pacific Roads-Freight Rates Also Unsettled-General Manager Dickinson Talks of Hard Times.

No sooner is a truce patched up in one section of the country between railroads so far as passenger rates are concerned than war is declared in another section, the latest oflender being the Great Northern in announcing new rates, effective June 18, which promise to make it mighty interesting for the Northern Pacific, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific, particularly for the former road.

Whether the Union Pacific will meet the new rates which the Great Northern has announced is a question that the gentlemen of the passenger department cannot answer in the absence of Mr. Lomax, but the consensus of opinion is that the new rates will be tried for a time at least before an effort is made to meet the cut, especially from Scattle and Tacoma, Butte and Helena and Montana common points

Nothing will prevent these rates from seriously affecting California rates and unless some sort of a compromise is reached before June 18, people will be riding from California and Montana at a rate that will

be startling to the traveling public.

Not content with the reductions in passenger rates, it is understood the Northern people will reduce sleeping car fare from \$15 to s, an item very considerable to the tourist who is doing the country on a purely economic basis. No opinion is expressed among railroad men as to just what the upshot of the whole affair will be, but it is generally understood that should the Great Northern persist in making rates from its eastern terminus to north Pacific copoints: First-class, \$35; second-class, \$25. Spokane, first-class, \$30; second-class, 20. To Helena and Butte. first-class, \$25; secondclass, \$18, there will be the largest sized sort of a row, demoralizing the whole transcontinental passenger business.

There is the gravest fear in Union Pacific circles that freight rates will go still lower and that the company will have to meet the new rates made by some one of the transcen-tinental roads or else go out of business from terminal points.

meeting in Chicago Tuesday between the lines members of the Transcontinental and Central Traffic associations was unproductive of a single thing that could be construed to mean a cessation of present differences.

For a couple of days the "Overland route" has not issued a supplemental tariff, the relations between the rivals for through business being about the same. One thing is certain, however, the Union Pacific's through freight earnings have commenced to assume infinitesimal proportions as com pared with the corresponding period las year, but there seems to be no help for the loss at present. While the Union Pacific is not dependent upon through freight bus iness for its earnings, a reduction in the volume of merchandise bauled makes a serious hole in Auditor Young's statement.

Curtailing Expenses. Mr. E. Dickinson, general manager of the Union Pacific, while looking content and happy, was evidently in a serious frame of mind when THE BEE reporter saw him. "Our only business at present is to curtail ex-penses," said Mr. Dickinson, because our earnings are getting decidedly down. Wherever possible we are laying off a man here and there to reduce the force in order to bring it within the limit of our business. We are also discontinuing trains wherever the earnings fall below the expenses of running them, so that the next monthly state-ment may not show a startling reduction in

In keeping with General Manager Dickinson's desire to reduce as far as practicable the train service on branch lines, the follow-ing trains will be discontinued Sunday: Trains No. 45 and 46, between Lincoln and Manhattan, Kan, on the Omaha & Republican Valley railroad; locals 121 and 122 from Echo to Park City, U. T.; Nos. 1 and 8, from Pocatello to Butte, Mont; trains Nos. 81 and 82, between Grand Island, Ord and Loup

City, and mixed trains Nos. 15 and 16, run ning between Julesburg and Denver. Kennedy Kicks. Mr. Charles Kennedy, speaking of the item in The Bee of yesterday announcing that there were 2,000 tickets of Burlington and Rock Island in the hands of brokers between Omaha and Chicago, said:
"It is preposterous to think of such a

thing, the tickets being limited to thirty days, which has made the brokers very much afraid of handling them. I am willing to bet that there are not fifty such tickets in this city. The only tickets that could be in brokers' hands are of Union Pacific issue, reading from Colorado common the Northwestern to Chicago, and there are mighty few of these.
