DUN'S REVIEW OF THE WEEK

Affairs in the Commercial World of More Than Passing Interest.

EFFECTS OF MONETARY UNCERTAINTIES

Trade in All Sections of the Country Ha Been Restricted-Reports from Bustness Centers-Business Failures for the Week.

NEW YORK, June 30 .- R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: The closing of Indian mints against silver, the fall of silver bullion to 62 cents in New York, 3214 pence at London on Thursday, the fall in wheat to 62% cents at Chicago and 70 cents at New York, the suspension of operations by miners and smelters of Colorado, and some other silver producing states, have made the past week one of unusual interest. Up to the present time domestic trade has not materially changed since last week, though increasingly restricted by monetary uncertainties.

Reports from Cities.

Philadelphia reports manufacturers unwilling to accept time contracts, but retail trade and collections have improved in most ines. Pittsburg reports increased weakness in

Pittsburg reports increased weakness in iron, and coal mining is dull.

At Cincinnati wholesale trade is larger than a year ago, but collections are slow, money slow and banks cautious.

At Cleveland there is no improvement in iron ore. Lake freights are depressed.

At Detroit business is fair and conservative and money close.

Chicago reports better accommodation for

tive and money close.

Chicago reports better accommodation for merchants, and, though business is still somewhat restricted, collections are less difficult. The closing of silver mines and smelting works may lessen orders, but it is believed only temporarily. Trade with farming regions is expected to improve with better crop prospects and a larger export demand. Provisions are steady, but wheat is at the lowest price for forty years, though now held by strong parties. The rotail trade of the city has been much enlarged by the World's fair. Receipts of products are generally smaller than a year ago and a decrease appears in clearings and sales of real estate and securities.

and securities.

At Milwaukee crop reports are encouraging, but in iron mining sections trade is much depressed, collections are slow and many extensions are asked. St. Paul reports a good crop prospect, collections slow and trade quiet.

St. Louis notes a fairly active wholesale trade, some decrease in collections and money in only moderate demand at 6 to 8 per cent.

Business at Kansas City is fair, but grain receipts very light.

Good Reports from Omaha. Omaha reports active trade in groceries and fair in dry goods.

At Denver business is moderate and collections slow. At New Orienns trade is very dull; money tight and collections slow, with banks very

conservative.

The supply of money at Mobile is ample for business. Atlanta reports trade generally satisfactory but money tight.
Charleston notes larger trade than usual in dry goods, hardware and snees, with poor

collections. Throughout the country, while collections are slow and failures numerous, the condition of legitimate business is regarded as healthy and hopes are entertained that the worst has passed. The hopes are mainly based on the belief that the silver law will be repealed and that the certainty of its repeal will encourage foreign investments here.

Lower prices of products also tend to increase merchandise exports. Wheat has reached prices regarded as out of the question a month ago, and yet the supply in sight is very large and returns from the northwest as to the coming harvest are more favorable. Corn is lower, with very good crop prospects, and oats about 2 cents lower. Hog products have declined 65 cents for pork per barrel and 15 cents for lard per 100 pounds, with increasing receipts of hogs. is an eighth lower, the stocks of American here and abroad being nearly 2,500,000 bales, though new cotton is but sixty days away. The state of foreign exchange indicates willingness to send money hither for loans or investments, but the Bank of England

by changing the rate for gold, shows de-termination to resist exports to this country. Merchandise exports continue heavy, while exports thus far in June fall about \$4,000,000 behind the same menth last year. The volume of domestic trade shrinks considerably, especially at the west. Clearings in June are about 10 per cent smaller than last

year, the decrease at the west being nearly 20 per cent.

Low Prices for Iron and Steel Business in fron and steel products is re-markably depressed, and experienced ob-servers pronounce the situation and outlook the most unfavorable ever known. The volume of business is quite large, but at the

lowest price on record. Trade in woolens is much restricted and waiting for future developments, neither manufacturers nor merchants caring to take risks which they can avoid. In boots and shoes a somewhat general suspension of manufacture at the east seems foreshadowed and while cotton mills are in good shape

there is much reluctance to enter into large engagements for the future.

The business failures of the last seven days number 334. For the quarter ending June 30, the failures in the United States number 3,199, as against 2,119 for the second quarter of 1892. For the six months of 1893 the failures number 6,401, against 5,503 during the same period in 1892, showing an increase of 898. The total liabilities of all the failures occurring in the first six months of 1893 are \$168,000,000, while for the same period in 1892 they were \$62,000,000, showing an increase of \$106,000,000.

WALL STREET FOR A WEEK.

Stocks Affected by the Policy of the Indian Government Toward Silver,

NEW YORK, June 30.—Bradstreet's Wall street review will tomorrow say: The sudden action of the Indian government in suspending free silver coinage has precipitated a crisis affecting silver interests throughout the world. The influence of this movement, coming upon a decidedly strained financial situation here, resulted in acute disturbance of the stock market. Preparations for the July disbursements have resulted in calling of loans, which, with the narrowed supplies of loanable funds in this and other leading money markets, and the generally unsettled condition of credits resulted in severe pres with a strong upward tendency, which, or Thursday last, carried the quotations up to three-eighths of 1 per cent per day, plus 6 per cent, the equivalent of about 75 per cent per annum. At this juncture, however, re-lief came from the action of the New York

banks.

The silver crisis has unquestionably aggravated the uncertainty, which is the worst feature of the pending situation. While the general conclusion is that the action of the Indian government renders the repeal of the Sherman act inevitable, it inrepeal of the Sherman act hevitable, it increases the anxiety for the settlement of the question and the avoidance of the strain involved in further delay. The demoralization of silver securities in London and of exchanges on other silver using countries than India was also unsettling, while the drop of silver bullion from 8134 to 62 and 65 cents per ounce and of silver bullion certificates to 62, were calculated to affect the market directly, while the closing of the market directly, while the closing of the mines and smelters in the west, which has followed so promptly the "street," because of the belief that railroads and other corporate interests would be unfavorably

corporate interests would be unfavorably affected, were considerations being reflected in the course of prices.

The drop in wheat was regarded with complacency in Wall street as having a tendency to stimulate foreign buying and thus break up the anomalous conditions in foreign exchange, which, depressed to a fraction over the gold-importing point by the stringency of money, does not bring in gold shipments on account of the scant supply of bills offered.

at a Few Points, Very Much Depressed. New York, June 30.—Bradstreet's weekly review of the state of trade will tomorrow say: The pressure in the New York money market incident to the July disbursements is aggravated by the drop in silver. Shipments of money from New York to the interior this week are \$4,000,000, more or less. Following the effects at Chicago of restriction of creditz and loans, the echo from Detroit and the detonation from the Pacific coast, come reports of increasing stringency at larger Texas cities, points where, until new, comparatively little of the financial disturbance has been felt. There is no general or radical improvement in the situation at eastern centers. The south reports no change and increasing stringency, but at the west, Cleveland, Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul, Omaha and Kansas City furnish phases of improvement, which point to a check to unfavorable symptoms, and Chicago and Kansas City banks are dis-counting more freely. The refusal of Sall Lake City and Charleston bankers to fur-nish clearings totals this week is due to marked decrease in volume, a feature characteristic of bank clearings as a whole, the aggregate being \$956,000,000, a decrease of 7.5 per cent for the week, and 7.5 per cent as

compared with the week a year ago. Prices of staples continue to decline, wheat touching another "lowest price," with a decrease of 2 cents, corn going off 1½ cents; oats, 1¾ cents; cotton, ⅓ cent; sugar, ⅓ cent; steel billets, 10 cents; pork, 50 cents; lard, 15 cents, and wool fractionally. Coffee scores an advance of 15 cent, borg are scores an advance of 14 cent, hogs are higher, petroleum higher and anthracite coal is booked for an advance today.

Business failures in the United States for six months ending June 28, exclusive of commercial and industrial concerns, where ac tual assets exceed liabilities, number 6,401, the largest six months total reported, but only 3 per cent larger than in 1891 and 2 per cent larger than in 1895, following the finan-cial panic of 1884. Liabilities this year equal \$470,000,000, nearly twice as much as in 1891, two and one half times as large as in 1885, and \$114,000,000 larger than in the first half of last year.

As the increase in the first quarter as com-

pared with last is only \$4,000,000, without an increase in the number of failures, the second quarter is responsible for the gain of 888 failures and \$110,000,000 liabilities. There were 284 failures having \$100,000 or more liabilities, with \$113.000,000 total liabilities, which represent an increase of 300 per cent in number and 600 per cent in aggregate debts. There were 175 failed banks with liabilities of \$43.000,000, an increase of 600 per cent in number over last year and more than 800 per cent in debts.

General Trade.

General trade through the country remains at a low ebb and leading industries are running on orders almost wholly without exception. Some will shut down for a por Exports of wheat (flour included) from both coasts of the United States and Canada equaled 3.971,000 bushels this week, the heaviest week's total this year, 25 per cent increase over the week last year and much heavier gains over like weeks in like pre-

ceding years. Decreases in stocks of wheat have been more rapid than over before, 5,800,500 bushels in the United States and Canada last week, decreasing European and affoat supplies about 6,500,000 bushels.
