Bad Slump at the Close Nearly Spoiled Yesterday's Record for Bulls.

WHEAT SHOWED CONSIDERABLE STRENGTH

This Was the Result of the Better Feeling in New York and London-Corn Received More than Usual

Attention.

CHICAGO, July 21 .- A bad slump at the close nearly spoiled today's record for the bulls in grain. The Milwaukee bank failure was largely the cause. Compared with last night wheat is down %c and corn %c. There was a show of firmness for two weeks in pork and lard, but actual transactions were not large. After an advance of \$1.60 in September pork it ended with a net gain of 85c. Lard, after an advance of 87%, wound up with the modest gain of 75c in September. October lard at the close shows no change since yesterday.

Ribs are 10c higher. Wheat showed considerable strength during most of the session, the result of better feeling in New York and London. Cables reported steady markets abroad, while a good cash de-mand was reported from other markets.

Hot temperatures were noted all over the northwest and there was considerable apprehension felt that the crop might be materially injured by reason of it. Shorts were good buyers, and there was a fair investment demand. While everything was indi-cating a strong market, news came of the failure of the Commercial bank of Milwaukee. The market got very nervous and turned weak during the last hour in response to a drop in stocks. There was free liquidation, There was a sharp decline in corn, which also helped to weaken wheat. The final figures were about the lowest of the day.

The principal feature was the relatively firmer tone to the near deliveries, cash selling up at one time to $\frac{1}{3}c$ over September. This would indicate that there was a better ship-ping demand for the cash article and had a strengthening effect on the more deferred fu-tures, but the closing out of a large long line increased the bearish sentiment and the mar-ket became weak. Bostow, July 21.—While reports from lead-ing wool dealers here have been mostly uni-form and generally unfavorable in tone as regards the condition of trade, still there are a few who seem to think they see a rift in the reefs of depression and are talking more hopefully. A botter demand is reported for other washed wools. Several mills have run out of stock and have been on the market this week. They found supplies here very short, however, as wool is coning along very slow, western farmers not being willing to sell at the prices here. Good double extra and above Ohio is quoted at 25c here, and a sale of 35,-000 lbs, st that price is reported the past week. Offers at under that price have been refused for the best wool. Straight XX is quoted at 24c, with a sale of 10,000 lbs, extra and above at from 28c to 24c and sales of a few small lots. In Michigan fleeces there has been little of consequence, selling quotations being from 20c

For fine delaine solections there has been good in-quiry and several good sales, but at low prices. The bulk of the good wool on the market could be easily bought at 25c and there is some offer-ing at 24c. Unwashed combing wools were in fair demand. There was one sale of 30,000 bs., one-quarter blood Kentacky, at from 224c to 25c, but these are extreme prices. Other sales have been 20,000 lbs, one-quarter blood at from 12c to 20c; 20,000 lbs, balt blood at 20c, and 15,000 lbs, quarter and three-eighths at from 19c to 20c. OMAHA LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

Trade Conditions Materially Improved Under a Falling Off in Receipts.

FRIDAY, July 21. It looks as if stockmen had discovered that when every one attempts on account of hard times to realize on their stock at the same time the realization fails short of the anticipation by several dollars. The result has been a big decrease in receipts of all kinds. There were less than 100 cars of stock here today all told, 1,700 fewer cattle and 3,200 fewer hogs than were here last Friday, while the shortage so far this week compared with last amounts to 3,500 cattle, 13,500 hogs and 1,500 sheep.

Less than 1,000 head of cattle were received, and of this number not over a fourth were natives. With continued light receipts and covering of short contracts during the afterbetter advices from eastern markets the demand very naturally improved and buyers noon and some purchases for the long acwere, all willing to pay substantially higher prices for cattle to their liking.
