NEWS FROM COUNCIL-BUFFS

Inquest in the Case of Frank Burdick Begun by the Coroner.

FACT OF MURDER FIRMLY ESTABLISHED

Evidence taken yesterday sustains the theory of foul play. Salomonson's testimony—What Chief Scanlan discovered—Continued today.

The swollen body of the Omaha harness-maker, Francis H. Burdick, who was found in the lake near Council Bluffs, still remains at Estep's undertaking rooms, none of his friends or relatives having yet put in an appearance or expressed their wishes concerning its disposal.

One of the strongest bits of evidence in confirmation of the theory of foul play was the result of a postmortem made by Dr. Waterman, which revealed the fact that Burdick had been struck on the head, a bruise being plainly discernible, extending from just above the right ear to the lower part of the back of the head, the space of the bruise being about the size of a man's hand, rather longer and wider.

Another important witness was Anton Benecke, who keeps a saloon just outside of the gate. Burdick was a friend of his, and he said he had seen him on Sunday night, and got a beer and a sandwich, and although flat broke during the day, he had enough to present a \$50 bill to get it changed.

How the Body was Found. J. H. Fultz, the policeman, testified to having seen Burdick Sunday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock. Burdick was then "completely full," and yet was able to take care of himself, walk about and talk intelligently. Fultz also testified to discoveries made by him, Chief Scanlan and others in looking about the vicinity where Burdick's body was found.

William R. Learn, one of the force at the beach, had heard of the little racket when Burdick was ejected from the grounds for being drunk, but knew little of the affair himself.

G. M. Gorman was the one who put Burdick on the grounds. This was about 7 o'clock Sunday evening. Burdick had been drinking all day and became a little too free in the use of epithets, especially when any one touched either of the two dogs which accompanied him.

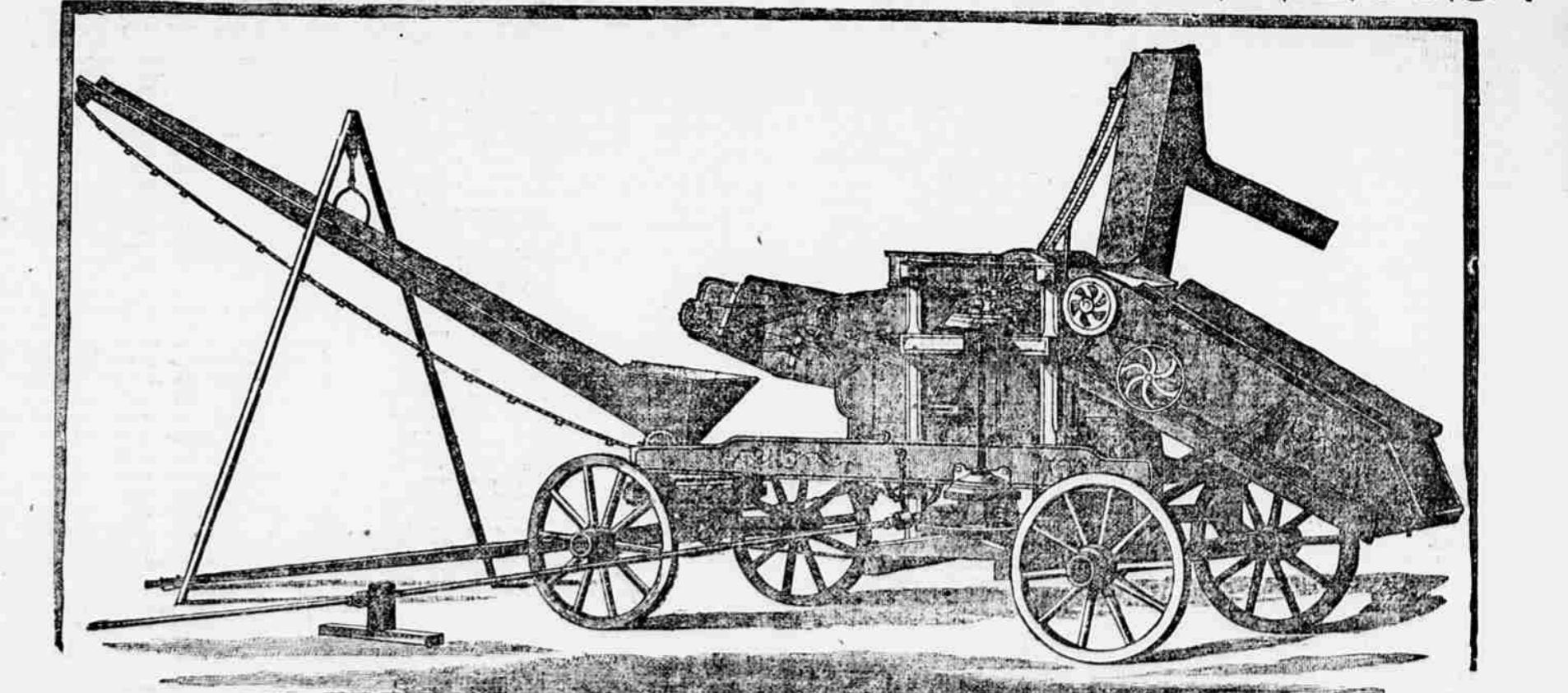
