DUN'S REVIEW OF THE WEEK

From the Banks to the Mills Improvement Has Extended.

CONDITION OF THE GREAT INDUSTRIES

After Months of Decline the Producing Forces of the Country Begin to Mend-A Brighter Outlook for the Future.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 .- R. G. Dun & Co.'s veckly review says: Improvement has extended from the banks to the mills. The condition of the great industries has distinctly mended, though still seriously depressed. More important by far than any rise in stocks is the fact that more works have resumed during the past week than have stopped operations, so that the producing force of the country, after months of constant decline, has begun to improve. The money markets are more healthy, the premium on currency has almost vanished, the improvements in domestic exchange have well nigh disappeared, and while very little money is yet available for commercial or industrial loans, there is some relief in that

respect also. Soft steel has reached the lowest point on record. \$20 at Pittsburg, and, consequently, all rail mills in the country are idie, but there is a somewhat better demand for hard-ware, wire rods, barbed wire and contracts for architectural work and agricultural implement supplies are reported at Chicago.

Sales of Wool.

Sales of wool have been the lowest on rec Sales of wool have been the lowest on record for years, 1,271,000 pounds, at the principal markets for the last week, against 7,616,800 for the same week last year, the average of 104 grades being 17 cents, the lowest for many years, and, in manufacture, it can hardly be said that recovery appears.

In the cotton milts resumption is quite general. The paper business is doing better, but shipments of boots and shoes from Boston are again 33 per cent smaller for the on are again 32 per cent smaller for the

ton are again 32 per cent smaller for the week than last year, and in three months there has been shipped about 800,000 cases, against 1,050,000 last year. Chicago receipts of cattle in August were 269,224 bead, against 318,551 last year, a decrease of over 15 per cent. These evidences of the extent of depression are needed now, because they show why the sudden recovery, which some look for, is not possible. It must take time to revive business after uch a shock is sustained, and there is no occasion for disheartenment if the recovery is slow. The prospects for corn have not improved, and the injury done by drouth seems to insure a much smaller yield than was ex-pected. The price during the week has advanced fully 1½ cents. Cotton has advanced to 8 cents with assurances that a new treasury arrangement will facilitate the supplies of money for moving the crop. After touching 8 cents it has fallen a sixteenth and crop reports are still favorable despite damage by the storm in South Carolina. That the volume of trade has been small if late is not surprising.

Last Month's Fallures. Exchanges through the principal clearing houses, outside of New York, continue to show a decrease in comparison with last year, for the past week of 24.3 per cent. Although several banks which were forced to stop in July and August have resumed this week, the progress of the test to the contract of the past week of the past week. ne numerous failures of the past two conths have thrown into confusion the calculation of merchants and campelled them to curtail operation. Incomplete returns of assets and liabilities for the month of August show that the liabilities in about 1,580 failures amounted to \$55,-446,030, and the returns for the remaining failures will probably raise the amount above \$50,000,000. The assets reported were \$67,828,210, and while 734 of the failures, with \$28,742,029 habilities, were at the west, there were 248, with \$21,236,997 liabilities, in eastern states, and 300, with \$5,467,064 liabilities, in southern states. BRADSTREET'S COMMERCIAL REVIEW Everything Indicates that a Change for the Better Has Taken Place. New York, Sept. 8.—Bradstreet's weekly review of the state of trade will say: The third successive week of improving financial conditions, followed by a stimulation of demand for staple articles at many points, has practically satisfied the commercial and industrial communities that a change for the better is a result of the improved condition, and that the movement will prove continuous. The last premium on currency has finally disappeared and the tendency of the bank deposits to increase, pointed out a week ago, has become general and pronounced. At nearly all the large financial centers funds are more easily obtainable, though, in only a few instances, at lower rates of interest or discount. The fall in rates of domestic exchange is widespread, and very little that is abnormal remains. A careful examination of detailed telegraphic reports of the state of trade to Bradstreet's makes it plain

that easier money, present or prospective, has stimulated confidence in an increased volume of trade this fall and next winter, but that the improvement in the financial situation has been relatively greater than in commercial lines. Industrially, the gain is commercial mes. Industrially, the gain is noteworthy, so many mills and factories have started up within the last two weeks. New England cotton and woolen mills re-main very generally idle, and the outlook is for lower wages in the former. Evidences of reviving trade are apparent in an increased demand from western and eastern creased demand from western and eastern jobbers of dry goods and hardware in one sale of 2,000,000 pounds of Territory, and 1,000,000 pounds of Texas wool. Western holders of pig iron are said to be asking an advance, but this is offset by lowest prices or record at other points. on record at other points.

The beginning of the upward swing of the pendulum reveals advances in prices this week, notably wheat at 1½ cents, lard, one-fourth of a cent; Indian cern, 2½ cents; coffourth of a cent; and mania and fee, three-eighths of a cent, and meats and rice among food staples, in addition to which oats are I cent higher, cotton is one-eighth of a cent higher and naval stores also, owing to damage from the storm.
