LITTLE HEADWAY IN SENATE

Morning Session Taken Up With Stewart's Resolution Concerning Senators' Honesty.

PROPOSAL TO FIX A DATE FOR THE VOTE

This Suggestion Meets with Some Opposition and No Compromise is Reached—Interesting Proceedings in the House—Cleveland Proposes Delay.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—When the senate convened this morning Mr. Mills of Texas gave notice that he would address the senate tomorrow. Senator Stewart's resolution for a committee to ascertain whether some of the senators were interested in national banks came up. Mr. Stewart addressed the senate in advocacy of it, but after a few moments he deferred into a general discussion of the silver question.

Mr. Allen, populist of Nebraska, favored the intention of the resolution. He said there were hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of people in the country who believed that much of the legislation of congress was influenced by the personal interests of senators and members. If they were mistaken it was due to senators and members that the people should be enlightened on the subject. Alluding to the democratic party, Mr. Allen said that when, for the first time in thirty years, it had an opportunity to enact remedial legislation for the people it had failed. Democratic confesses that their platform was a fraud and a false pretense and that the party had thus secured the votes of the people. Democratic senators, he said, must abandon their party and join the ranks of the populists, who were going to triumph in 1896.

Resolved on Repeat.

At 2 o'clock the general bill was taken up. Senator Voorhees asked that one week from today the general state should be adjourned so that the committee could deliberate at that time before the bill was referred under the five-minute rule until Saturday at 2 o'clock, when the vote should be taken. Mr. Voorhees said he had this in the interest of the faithless. The bill was referred to the Committee on Banking and Currency and the committee itself.

If a majority of the senate was against repealing the fact should be known. If it was in favor of amending it that should be known. But as fair dealing men let the senators come to some understanding when the vote might be expected to end their labors.

Mr. Dubois, republican of Idaho, while appreciating the courtesy with which the senator from Indiana was conducting the debate, said that he was too soon to make any haste, and the silver-spirited were eager to have a fair discussion. He therefore objected to the request of Mr. Voorhees.

Mr. Voorhees said nothing was further from his purpose than to interfere with legitimate legislative proceedings. He (Voorhees) was a better friend of silver today than any man who resorted to destructive methods to keep this miserable law on the statute book. He could not always say that he would be compelled to destroy the silver money. He expected, when the Sherman act was repealed, to engage in bringing about a proper system of coinage, as he had in the past. As objection was made to his request fix the time to take the vote, he resolved to fix the time to take the vote.

Mr. Sharp, republican of Idaho then addressed the senate in opposition to the bill. Senator Dolph, republican of Oregon, followed Sharp, and did not believe that with free coinage at 16 to 1 or 20 to 1, or any other ratio, gold and silver could be secured. Could the United States ignore the action of the great commercial countries of the world in regard to silver?

On the motion of Senator Voorhees the senate went into executive session and shortly thereafter adjourned.

IN THE HOUSE

DISCUSSION ON THE PRINTING AND PUBLISHING OF GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The house, today, after a practical suspension of business since last Saturday when the rules were adopted, took off its coat and went to work.

Mr. Tipton of South Carolina took advantage of what promised to be another day of enforced idleness and, for the reason, as he expressed it, that "the people were trying for relief," presented for immediate consideration a resolution instructing the banking committee to report a bill for the issue of \$100,000,000 in treasury notes for distribution among the people. Of course the distribution of what was to be done was left to the discretion of the committee.

The next speaker was Mr. Lovering of Connecticut. After a short speech he complained that the slab was composed of copper manufacturers of New England who represented a capital of \$70,000,000. He argued for continuation of the protective system.

Mr. Wright of Warren, Pa., objected to the tax imposed on the importation of cattle, and said the tax was high it operated as a prohibitive tariff.

MASTERLY INACTIVITY.

Course Suggested by the White House for the House of Representatives.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The administration has altered its determination with reference to the Everett bill, or, testing the time limit allowed under the Gage act for the Chinese to register at September 1, 1894. Last night at a conference held at the residence of Secretary Carlisle, at which, in addition to the secretary of the treasury, there were present Secretary Gresham, Attorney General Olney and Representative Gage of California, members of the administration expressed the opinion that the bill ought to be pushed through both houses at once, and the intention was manifested of holding a joint session with the bill in the house. Gage, however, pointed out radical defects in the bill, which would render its effect nugatory. He also declared the extension of the time for registering should be reduced to six months, so that the term originally intended should be specifically defined, and the imprisonment clauses should be modified. He also wanted a provision inserted for photographing all Chinese who registered.

It was agreed to refer the bill to a committee, and accordingly today the bill was referred by the foreign affairs committee to a subcommittee which will meet tomorrow night.

Today it developed that Mr. Cleveland himself was in favor of passing the bill, for fear it will complicate matters in the senate. In fact, he is in favor of the house holding its hands and doing nothing until the senate acts on the bill. During the three days ending tonight 4200 certificates were issued. SUFFERING FROM SUNSTROKE

Heat on the Borders of Cherokee Strip Lying Out Many Thousands.

EXCITEMENT WITH THUGS AND SHARPERS

Gamblers Shot Three Members of a Vigilance Committee and Tore Their Bodies in a Well—Booths to Remain Open All Night.

ARKANSAS CITY, Kan., Sept. 13.—Heat that was registered on the thermometer at 100° in the shade, the air filled with a suffocating dust and one of Kansas' noted hot winds blowing across the prairies as if straight from the mouth of a seven-times heated furnace, were the severe conditions that the persons along the Cherokee line were forced to endure today.

Some could not endure them and succumbed. Some rallied, but others died. At this place over fifty were overcome by the heat, most of them being among those who were standing in line before the registration booths. Of those stricken, six have died, while others are in a dangerous condition. At Caldwell there were twenty cases of sunstroke, two resulting in death. At Oklahoma twenty-two sunstrokes were reported and two deaths, and at Hennessey eighteen, with one death. The sun went down in a clear sky tonight and the indications are that tomorrow will be a repetition of today.

WILL Register Day or Night.

The crush at the registration booths here has been so great that from now on they will be kept open twenty-four hours, with day and night forces of clerks at work. During the three days ending tonight 4200 certificates were issued. If the same proportion is maintained for the three succeeding days the number of homeowners who will make the race for homes at noon Saturday will be in the neighborhood of 45000.

The total number of certificates does not tally with the number of homeowners, for most of the homeowners take out certificates for both themselves and town lots.

Going for the Gamblers.

Sergeant Morgan brings word from Oklahoma of a terrible tragedy that occurred there yesterday. Owing to the numerous thefts and depredations occurring there the gamblers have been compelled to change their abiding places. They crossed John Faris, a shabby worker, forced him to return the money earned from the victims, gave him thirty lashes on the bare back and drove him from the camp. Richard Martin, John Gresham and David Weller, members of a mob of vigilantes, committed to a gambler's tent near the Ardenwood hotel for the purpose of making an arrest. The crowd of gamblers and thugs who were gathered there, fearing that they would be arrested, surrounded them with knives and pistols, and in a moment's time there were three bodies bleeding on the floor of the tent. The gamblers and their friends picked up the bodies and carried them to a public well nearby to drown them. In less than a few moments until the angry Strippers gathered around the well, when the bodies were taken out. Some men giving information as to where the dead were found, and the police, and other troopers, however, did not find the gamblers had escaped. The tent was demolished and searching parties are scouring the country in every direction.

From Whisky Bottles to Revolvers.

At 3 o'clock this morning a serious fight took place near the booths here. A gambler drove out in a carriage with two women to see the sights. A company of soldiers, however, who were in the city, and who had been sent to disperse the mob, attempted to defend them. He took a bottle of whisky out of his pocket and proceeded to beat one of the saloons over the head with it. The soldier tried to get at his revolver, but the gambler forced him to retreat and the soldier shot him in the back. The soldier then fled.
