## COMMERCIAL AND FINANCIAL It Was Pardridge Against the Growd Yesterday in the Wheat Pit. FINAL PRICES SHOW LITTLE CHANGE

6

Corn Was Affected by the Enormous Receipis, but the Shipping Demand Easily Held the Weakness in Check,

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 -- It was Pardridge against the crowd today in the wheat pit. The planger made a sudden right about face and appeared in his old-time role as a bear of the most ferocious kind. He is supposed to have sold short today not less than 2,500,000 bu. In wheat, however, and in everything else the range of prices was narrow--%c in grain and 15c in provisions. Compared with Saturday, today's final prices show no important change. It was delivery day on October contracts, but only a little stuff went around.

Wheat receipts in the northwest, while regarded at first glance as enormous-being 1,292 cars were actually nearly 600 cars less than the same time a year ago. On the other hand, there was a decrease of nearly 500,000 bu, reported in the amount of wheat and flour on ocean passage and the stock of wheat and flour in Liverpool shows a marged

decrease of nearly 500,000 bu. The visible supply showed a large in-crease, but was over 1,000,000 bu less than it was the same week last year. The market opened about from 1se to be lower, de clined be more, then recovered, prices advancing 14c, declined 14c for December and only 14c for May, advanced some, held steady, and closing the same for December and Mc higher for May than Saturday's closing. . The corn market was affected by the

cuormous receipts-1,183 cars -where only 940 cars were expected. But the weakness was held in check by the shipping demand. There was some liquidation by longs and a moderate amount of short selling, but a good many shorts were taking profits and prices kept within 3/ce range, finishing a shade higher than Saturday.

In oats there was free selfing by elevator men and only a scattering demand. Prices receded from 1/4 c to 3/8 c, but reacted from lac to lic.

The provision market gave some indication of the existence of a moderate shortage for October, but no one seemed inclined to change places with the shorts when they wanted to buy. Transactions only took place at widely separated intervals. Compared with Saturday's closing October pork is 30c higher and January is 12140 up. October lard gained 5c and January improved 10c. October and January ribs advanced respectively 5c and 7%c.

### Cattle Open Fairly Active-Hogs Scarce and Uncertain. .

MONDAY, Oct. 2. The week opens out as usual with a fair run of cattle and sheep and light supplies of hogs. There were 174 loads of cattle received, but of these less than 10 per cent were natives and in the entire lot there were less than forty loads that the dressed men can use. As all local houses were in need of supplies the market was active and

prices strong for decent stuff. A bunch of pretty good 1,277-lb, cornfed natives sold for \$4,40, and very fair westerns weighing upwards of 1,200 lbs. readily brought \$3.50. The commoner grades of western cattle were

slow sale at prices no better than, if as good, as at the close of last week. Texans sold down around \$2.30 and \$2.50, and \$3 to \$3.35 bought quite a few westerns. It did not take very long to exhaust the supply of beef cattle, the general tone to the trade






### Notes Signed by Business Firms that Turned Out to Be Forgeries.

"Apart from my interest in the firm of Bloomingdale Bros.," said Mr. Krause, "I have for a long time been dealing in commercial pafalo people. per, and have had a good many until the site committee meets in Syracuse transactions with the late Samuel Adler, next week. who had a marble yard on East Fiftyseventh street.

On May 7 last his son Oscar brought me a note purporting to be signed by L. F. Robertson & Sons, 39 Spruce street, for \$750, pay able at four months in the Hide and Leather National bank. It was endorsed by Samuel Adler, and I had no hesitation in discounting it, believing it to be genuine Early in June I ascertained the note was a orgery and 1 complained to Inspector Mc

Loughlin. "I held at that time about \$20,000 worth of Adler's notes, and I began to investigate whether they were all right or not. Everyone of them was declared to be forged and they purported to be signed by business firms

in good standing. "On Saturday, June 17 last, a detective was sent to arrest Samuel Adler, but my lawyer told him not to make the arrest until Sunday morning The man must have had some inkling of what was coming, for when the detective got to the house on the morn ing of June 18 there was a crowd at the door and the detective found Adder lying dead in his bed on the second floor with a smoking revolver by his side. He had blown his brains out to avoid the disgrace of arrest. "Since that time I have=pondered over this matter, and from the opinion of experts now believe that Oscar Adler, the 19-yearold son of the suicide, was the one who did the forgeries, and he was arrested yester-day. I am a loser of nearly \$22,000, and I will do all I can to prosecute and convict the




