

# SCANDAL ON A BIG RANCH

One of the California Land Comyanies Finds Itself Largely Loser.

INQUIRY INTO THE MANAGER'S CONDUCT

He is Charged with Diverting the Funds of the Corporation-Investigators Fail to Agree and Will Present Two Reports.

San Francisco, Oct. 11 .- A big scandal has been developed here in the affairs of the Stearns Rancho, a corporation, which at one time owned 130,000 acres in California, and is still one of the heaviest landed corporations on the Pacific slope.

The Chronicle prints a story of an investigation of the affairs of the company. The story is that a committee of three disinterested business men have been for three or four months investigating the conduct of the manager of the business of the corporation, Colonel R. J. Northam, who is a member of the governor's staff, and one of the best known public men in the state. The paper states that the committee has about completed its work, and in a few days will report to the stockholders. The committee consists of Barclay Henley, George B. Pol-

hemus and E. W. McGraw. It is reported there will be a majority and a minority report. The majority report, by Henley and Polhemus, will state that \$100,000 of the income of the ranch has been illegally diverted. It is not charged that there has

been any embezziement, however. In his minority report McGraw will de-fend Colonel Northam in his action as custodian of the property of the company. The late Moses Hopkins was president of the company. It is claimed Hopkins gave Colonel Northam oral authorization to dispose of the property of the company and that Northam has legal justification for all his acts and a valid claim against the ranch for all many said to have been disposed for the company and the law been disposed for the law and the law been disposed for the law and th all money said to have been diverted from the treasury.

Interested parties are very much worried over the publicity of the trouble and the facts are hard to get. So far as learned no legal steps toward a settlement of the difficulty have been taken.

#### WOMAN ARRESTED FOR FORGERY.

Mrs. Laura Junkerman of Salem, Ill., Taken Into Custody at Salt Lake. SALT LARS, Oct. 11 .- Sheriff M. J. Helm arrived here today with requisition papers rom the governor of Illinois for Mrs. Laura Junkerman, who is under sixteen ndictments for forgery at Salem, II. Mis. Junkerman was in business with her husband at Salem about year ago, and while so engaged forged sixeen notes, aggregating in amount about \$1,550. She has lived in Salt Lake for the past eight months under the name of Helen Lane. On September 14she and Amos Wagman of Chicago secured a marriage license, but the wedding never came off. The woman was arrested late last evening and Sheriff Helm started with her for Salem.

#### HIS HEAD IS MISSING.

Body of an Unknown Man Found Floating Down the Rio Grande. Socorro, N. M., Oct. 11.-The naked body of a large, heavy-set man was discovered floating down the Rio Grande on Sunday last, about four miles south of here. The hands and feet were tied with bands of cloth, evidently torn from the man's shirt, and the head was missing, having been cut smoothly from the body. The head was not found and the body is as yet unidentified. The body was brought to the morgue, where an investigation is in progress. It is thought that a horrible murder has been committed somewhere in the Rio Grande valley.

## ACCUSED OF EMBEZZLEMENT

Charges Against a Cattleman Who Mortgaged Some Steers.

BRETT BROUGHT TO OMAHA FOR TRIAL

Investigating a Cattle Deat Damage Suits Against the East Omaha Street Rail-

way-Itotel Man Sued for Dams

ages for a Guest's Death.

The strong arm of the law has reached out and gathered John M. Brett into its clutches, and accompanied by an officer he has returned to this city to answer to the charge of having embezzled from and defrauded Perry Bros. & Co., a South Omaha live stock commission firm, out of \$7,443, by mortgaging a bunch of steers which it is claimed

that he never owned. For a month or more a warrant for the arrest of Brett has been filed away among the files in the office of Justice Smith, but owing to the fact that the whereabouts of Brett were unknown the service was not made. A few days ago it was reported that Brettiwas in the vicinity of Wood River, in the western part of the state, and thither an officer journeyed, finding his man and bringing him back to this city, arriving Tuesday night. Upon reaching here Brett was at once taken before Justice Smith, where he asked for a continuance of the hearing of the case, which was granted and the trial set for November 9, bonds being given by the defendant that he would be on hand at the day for the hearing.

the hearing. The information filed charges that on May The information filed charges that on May 18, 1893, Brett represented to the commission firm that he was the owner of 318 head of steers, which were in the custory of Harmon brothers and on their stock ranch in Cherry county, this state, and that by reason of the representations he succeeded in securing a loan for \$7,443. Since then, the parties who have sworn out the information aver that they have discovered that the representations were false, and that Beest representations were false, and that Brett was not the owner of the stock which he mortgaged.

Suit Against the Millard. Thomas Swobe, the proprietor of the Milard hotel, finds himself with a \$5,000 damage suit on his hands, brought simply because he allowed a guest to die in room 94 of the hotel a couple of years ago.

The suit is brought by Edgar P. Reed, administrator, and Mary S. Menneiley, administrator, and Mary S. Menneiley, administrator, of the estate of Samuel D. W. Menneiley, deceased, who was a former resident of Moaroe county, New York.

On October 12, 1801, Menneiley, a traveling man, came to the hotel and was assigned to room 94, to which he repaired shortly after eating his support. The next morning he did room 14, to which he repaired shortly after eating his supper. The pext morning he did not get up in time for breakfast, but nothing was thought of the matter until sometime later, when a girl in passing through the corridors detected the smell of escaping gas from room 94. This caused an investigation, and when the door was forced the New York man was dead. The theory of suicide was advanced, and a verdict to that effect rendered by the coroner's

dict to that effect rendered by the coroner's jury. The remains were sent back to the east and nothing more was heard of the matter until today, when the administrator and the administratrix brought the suit herein mentioned.

In their petition the plaintiffs allege that when Menneiley was assigned to the room the gas was turned on and that in that condition it remained, causing his death.

Lewis N. Godola, an Omaha poticeman, has gone into the courts for the purpose of securing a large slice of the wealth of the East Omaha Street Railway company's wealth. He avers that one evening last summer he was a visitor at Courtland beach, having paid the fees which entitled him to the privileges of the place. After having old, called at the police station and told a that he concluded to return been there for a long period of time, he avers

until he reached the oint where the car turns into the Locust erect line. There, through the reckless-ess of the men in charge of the train, he avers that he was thrown to the ground with such violence as to sustain a broken leg and a budly bruised shoulder which sent him to be for the period of three months. On account of all of this, Gadola declares that he is entitled to recover damages in the sum of \$10,000 and the costs of the suit.

Another Damage Case. The case of Ingre Madsen against the Omana Street Railway company is on trial for the second time, and was heard by Judge Duffic and a jury yesterday. The plaintiff seeks to recover a judgment for \$12,200, alleging an injury which was caused by the care-lessness and negligence of the company's employes. She avers that during the evening of an August day in 1891 she was a passenger on the Sherman avenue line, between the north end and South Omaha, Upon reaching the intersection of Seventeenth and Burt streets she jumped off the car, and in so doing slipped and fell, preaking her thigh and bruising her person. She at once brought suit and the case went to trial at the last term of the district court, the jury returning a verdict for \$1.500 in her, favor. On the showing that the damages, awarded by the jury were excessive, a new,

trial was granted, and at this time the case is having its second inning. At the last term of the district courts

Amanda Leach had a suit against the Omaha Street Railway company, in which, she sought to recover the sum of \$15,000, damages sustained by reason of having fallen off a Park avenue car at the intersection of Pacific street. The case was fought; to a finish and Mrs. Leach succeeded in recovering the sum of \$250. Now Mrs. Leach has another law suit on her hands, but it is of a different nature, and is brought for the purpose of obtaining a separation from her husband, Lewis, whom she alleges is a worthless fellow. She declares that he is a cruei man, and that he has compelled herself and her two daughters, both the fruits of a former marriage latake, overing the sum of \$250.
