REMAINED IN PERIL FOR AN HOUR

WEST UNION, Ia., Nov. 29.—[Special Telegram to The Bee.]—Last evening while Miss Emma Kubit was returning home from a call at her uncle's she slipped on the ice by an open well and fell into it. The water came up to her neck, and being unable to make any one hear her cries she remained in this position for about an hour and a half. When finally rescued she was unconscious and nearly chilled to death. Her recovery is doubtful. She was to have been married next Sunday.

NO PROGRESS MADE

Consultation Between the Council Committee and the Terminal Company.

The conference between the Omaha Bridge and Terminal Railway company and the committee of the city council which was appointed to investigate the advisability of extending the charter of the company for another two years took place yesterday afternoon at the city building.

The company was represented by its attorney, C. J. Green, and the council by Aldermen Smith, Jennings and White. So far as can be learned, the consultation was not very satisfactory to either side. The committee insisted that the company should pay \$1,200,000 in advance for the extension of the charter. No compromise seemed to be possible, and, indeed, Mr. Green claimed not to be well enough acquainted with the conditions of the track at the time the accident occurred to suggest the terms of a compromise intelligently. He thought the dispute would better be determined by the courts, and it is probable that a suit will have to be tried before anything is gotten out of the company.

Some of the city officials incline to the belief that the company is merely doing a little preliminary sparring, hoping that public sentiment on this side of the river will prove to be so strong in favor of the building of a new motor line that the council will be compelled to waive what rights it may have and grant the extension without consideration from the company.
