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Report for Scanlan Service to Form a Basis for an Appeal
IRREGULARITIES CHARGED IN THE COUNT
Agreement as to the Course of Procedure Adopted at the Contest Departed From by the Majority of the Electors

The judges in the election contest held their final session yesterday morning and rendered their decision. Judges Heald and Benjamin, the democratic judges, held that Scanlan was elected by a vote of 4,484 to 4,475 and their decision was so entered upon the books in the county auditor's office. The amount of costs charged upon the loser was \$206.45. Of this amount the judges receive \$124.45 and the reporter \$84. Witness fees to the amount of \$30.00 were charged up for the contestant's witnesses and \$10.00 for those of the incumbent.

Judge Sims dissented from his colleagues, and according to the estimate he makes Scanlan is really elected by one vote. Unfortunately for Scanlan, however, there are too many of the judges who do not see the thing as Sims does, so that the truth or falsity of Sims' claims can be proven only by an appeal to the district court. Scanlan's attorneys are making an examination of the returns and an appeal, but they thought an appeal an impossibility as it would require Judge Sims to render his dissenting opinion. This document will make interesting reading.

My judgment is that the court adopted the correct rule of construction at the outset of this matter, and that it is with respect to the provisions in the law with respect to the preparation of ballots by the voters should be strictly construed, which the provisions with reference to the counting of the ballots and returns should be liberally interpreted.
