EARLY TRADES WERE AT A DECLINE

This Was Ascribed to the Amount of that Cereal on Ocean Passage and the Rally Resulted from the Visithe Supply Report.

CIIICAGO, Feb. 26 .- Wheat was weak at both ends and strong in the middle of today's session, closing with a loss of 7ac for May. A decrease in the visible supply caused a temporary firmness, but free selling, an increase in the amount of wheat and flour on ocean passage and rumors favorable to "Farmer" Hatch's anti-option bill were too much for the bulls and the market was generally weak. Corn closed 5sc lower; May oats %c lower and provisions lower all around.

The opening trades in wheat were at a decline of from %c to %c as compared with the prices current on Saturday. There was a gradual hardening of the prices for an hour and a half, during which time particulars of the visible supply statement were coming in. That being satisfactory to the buils, when it was completed the harden-ing process continued for a few minutes, and then dissolved entirely. The trade had been light during the time referred to and those who felt disposed to buy wheat on the in the visible supply-which was the change announced in the week's stock-had already done so, when Pardridge and Leming came done so, when Pardridge and Leming came upon the scene with selling orders, which for a time appeared to have no limit. There were no buyers left on the spot to take those offerings sufficiently fast and the re-sult was a collapse. The opening decline was ascribed to the following causes: The amount of wheat on ocean passage there are increases of 572 000 but since a
