Wheat Was Strong, Advanced Eeveral Points and Closed at a Gain.

THERE WERE NUMEROUS BULL FACTORS

Better Cables, Big Export Clearances and a Reported Decrease in the Visible Supply Were Features of the Day.

CHICAGO, March 1 .- Wheat was strong and advanced 1%c, retaining %c of that at the close. Better cables, big export clearances and a reported decrease in the visible supply were pronounced buil factors and fair buying aided in the advance. A revision of the visible supply figures later caused a reaction near the finish, but May was %c from the bottom at the close. May corn is unchanged, May cats Vsc higher and provisions lower all around.

Wheat started firm at about %c improvement over yesterday's closing prices. There was some selling for a few minutes and after a decline in the price from 59%c, its starting point, to from 591/2c to 591%c, it turned and advanced under a strong demand. For an hour and a half there was a large busi-ness done. Commission houses were well supplied with buying orders, largely in small supplied with buying orders, largely in small lots, but there was plenty of those, and lo and more was quickly added to the price after the small decline already mentioned. By 11:30 o'clock 60%c was paid for May. The Cincinnati Price Current said that the week had been more trying than previously the been in terms and that interior for whent. It remarked also that interior supplies were so reduced that mills are obliged to draw heavily on market centers.

A supplement to that was received in pri-ate distatches from the Cincinnati Price Current which gave an estimate of the wheat in farmers hands, placing it at 86,000,000 bu. less than at this time a year ago, 64,000,000 bu, less than the avearge for twelve years and 12,000,000 bu, less than the smallest stock in those years. In addition to the effect of these figures, the clearances of wheat and flour from the four principal At-lantic ports amounted to about 600,000 bu. Receipts were 64 cars, against 43 last year. Minneapoils reported 223 cars and Duluth 31 cars, compared with 277 cars and 22 cars respectively on the corresponding day of last year. Liverpool stocks were 1,290,000 bu, smaller now than on February I. A drop of 1-16d in English consols caused some addition to the bullish feeling while

the advance was in progress. The top of the bulge was reached about 12:15 o'clock, and then some sifting of the Price Current's figures caused a revulsion of feeling in the crowd. On inquiry of the elitor of the Journal he stated that he esti-mated the present stock, exclusive of what is in the regular visible supply, at 136,000,000 bu., and as the government gave the farmers' stock a year ago at 135,000,000 bu, that ex-planation took the edge off the bull feeling which the first manner of putting forth the statement had produced. The Price Current's comparisons are all made with its own previous estimates. Cables gave an advance at Liverpool from ¼d to 1d. The decline from the highest price of the day stopped at 60¼c.
