CHICAGO, April 9 .- There were severe mough fluctuations in all the leading markets today to satisfy the craving of the most restless scalper. So far as wheat is concerned the ultimate result of considerable excitement and a heavy business was the improvement in the price as compared with Saturday's values. Offerings were not very free at the decline, the trade not caring to sell short much in the face of the government report tomorrow, and the demand improved, prices advancing from 1%c to 1%c, eased 3sc off, changed some and closed 4c higher for May and tic higher for July. The selling today was by the private wire concerns on reports of rain in Kansas, advices from Parsons, Olathe, Topeka and Wichita reporting rains. The weather map showed colder conditions in the west, northwest and southwest, a little snow in Colorado and heavy rains in Missouri, Illinois and the Missouri river valley as far north as Omaha. Good buying started early, which caused a sharp rally. Many of the local operators, while feeling outte bullish, think the market here ou of line with other markets. NEW YORK, April 9 .- The week opened on the Stock exchange with a firm tone to the speculation and in most cases the first prices made were a fraction above the closing figures of Saturday. During the morning the trading was fairly active, and except for some of the specialties, the martet was steady to strong. GENERAL GREAT ACTIVITY IS THE RESULT

Cattle Sell Quickly at an Advance of Ten to Fifteen Cents-Hogs Also Score a Sharp Rise - Sheep Scarce.

MONDAY, April 9.

Dealers generally were considerably disappointed at the smallness of supplies today. There were omy 127 cars of all kinds here and of these there were 90 cars of cattle. The cattle market was nearly as much of a surprise as the receipts were. Prices ruled from 10c to 15c higher than Saturday, and it seldom that 2,000 cattle change hands quicker than they did today. On account of the favorable tone to eastern advices shipping and speculative buyers were in the saddle early and ready for business. Liberal outside orders and the smallness of the supply made the dressed beef men anxious, and taken altogether sellers found conditions very much to their liking. The general quality of the cattle offered was very fair, but there were no strictly choice beeves here. Good 1,200 to 1,400-th beeves sold at from \$3.70 up to \$4.15. and fair to good 1,000 to 1,150-lb steers sold readily at from \$3.50 to \$3.75. Fair to poor stuff and odds and ends went at from \$3.40 down. It was a good, strong, active, healthy market from start to finish and by 10 o'clock business was practically

The same activity characterized the trade in butchers' and canners' stock, but there was no quotable advance in prices. Offerings included less than a dozen loads, and buyers soon picked them up. The market for yeal calves was firm and for rough stock of all kinds active and stronger. Stockers and feeders were in good demand

and higher. The fresh supply was light and the pens were by no means crowded with stale cattle. Regular dealers were all good buyers and quite a few hay-fed west-erns went over the scales at from \$3.25 to \$3.55. The feeling on all sides was firm. 
