Conley Made President of the Newly Organisea City Council.

BRENNAN AGAIN BECOMES CHIEF OF POLICE

Van Will Succeed Captain Mitchell-How Mayor Johnston Made Up His Commiltees Business Done by the New Council Other News.

Mayor Ed Johnston, City Clerk Joseph J. Maly and Councilmen James H. Bulla, Frank Koutsky, William Mullaly, Edward P. Conley, John J. Ryan, John S. Walters, Henry Mies and William M. Wood were present at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, then the city council met for the first lime under the new administration.

The bonds of Councilmen Mics, Ryan, Walters, City Clerk Maly, Police Judge Frank Christman and Mayor Johnston were approved.
Edward P. Conley was unanimously elected president of the council.
Mayor Johnston then made the following committee appointments, which, on motion,

Public Lights—Wood, Conley and Walters, License—Mullaly, Mies and Bulla. Printing—Conley, Bulla and Ryan. Charity—Koutsky, Mies and Wood. The resignations of Chief of Police Miles d. Mitchell, Captain James Austin and Offi-

cer James D. Courtney of the police force were read and accepted. Police Officer O. B. Tubbs was removed. Mayor Johnston appointed ex-Marshal Thomas Brennan as chief of police, and the

appointment was promptly confirmed.

The mayor was empowered to employ an expert accountant to settle the accounts of officials of the last administration.
Councilman Conley offered the following resolution:

Councilman Conley offered the following resolution:

Whereas, The law regulating the sale of liquors requires the publication of a notice of application for license for two weeks in the paper having the largest circulation in the county in which the business is to be conducted, and

Whereas, The recent decision of the supreme court of this state has declared that the different editions of a newspaper, editions issued by the same publishers or company, shall be considered as separate newspapers in the publication of this notice, therefore be it

Resolved, For the purpose of assisting the applicants for license in determining which paper shall be the proper one in which to advertise, the publishers of the different newspapers in this county be requested to furnish this council with a statement, under oath, of the actual circulation in Douglas county of their respective newspapers for the three months ending March 31, 1891. In case any of the publishers issue more than one edition, then their statement shall show the circulation in said county. These figures to be handed to the city clerk not later than April 16, before the session of the council of that evening.

The council then adjourned to meet next Monday evening.

Chief of Police Brennan made his first Chief of Police Brennan made his first official move yesterday by appointing John Van Wie captain of police. Captain Van Wie is one of the old, trusty and ever effi-cient members of the police force and his appointment will give general satisfaction among all persons who desire an effective police force. Thus far every appointment made by the new administration has been

well received.

Brennan has resigned his position with the Union Stock Yards company.

The police force will be scaled down under Mr. Johnston's administration to eight or ten men all told. Mayor Johnston will try the efficiency of eight good police officers, and believes that number sufficient for the present needs of the city, considering the city's ability to pay salaries. This move, too, will not only meet the approval

generally. No change has yet been made in the fire department and none will be for the pres-ent, but when the change comes, as it soon will, the chief will be an officer of the past and the department will be placed under command of one of the regular fire-men with rank of captain.

Street Commissioner Joseph M. Tobias has sent in his resignation to Mayor Johnston. This office will be left vacant ston. This office will be left vacant and unless some pressing occasion requires the salary of that officer will be saved to the city under the new regime. Mr. Tobias has been a careful and industrious official. The popularity of Thomas Hoctor, who succeeds himself, is attested by the largest majority on the ticket, and that, too, against one of the best and strongest men in the city, and also, by receiving the largest yote ever given any one in South

largest vote ever given any one in South Judge James M. Fowler made more friends and antagonized fewer persons dur-ing his presiding over the police court than any other official ever in the city. Judge

Fowler's record is as creditable to the city as it is worthy of himself.

City Clerk Henry Ditzen, by his courteous and obliging ways, won a friend in every man who had business with that city office, and Mr. Maly will do well to keep up the commendable pace. keep up the commendable pace. City Attorney Van Dusen gets credit as being one of the most efficient of the de-fenders of the city's legal interests. Even enemies of the late administration give Mr. Van Dusen credit for conscientiously and successfully protecting the city from large and illegal claims.

All of the new members of the city coun-cil, except Henry Mies, have had experience in municipal affairs, and as all are thoroughly familiar with the city's condi-tion and wants, there is no reason why the new council should not meet the ex-pectations of its friends. Of course Coun-cilman Bulla, Walters, Ryan and Mies feel clated, as they each received several feel clated, as they each received several hundred votes more than was ever before cast for a councilman. This is not only a compliment, but to three of them endorsements of their past municipal records.
