The bonds of Councilmen Mies, Ryan, Walters, City Clerk Maly, Police Judge Frank Christian and Mayor Johnston were approved. The council then adjourned to meet next Monday evening.

Chief of Police Brennan made his first official move yesterday by appointing John Van Wie captain of police, Captain Van Wie is one of the old, tried and true efficient members of the police force and his appointment will give general satisfaction among the persons who desire an effective police force.

Street Commissioner Joseph M. Tobias has sent in his resignation to Mayor Johnston. This office will be left vacant until a new one is appointed. The salary of that officer will be saved to the city under the new regime.
