Fear of a Cold Wa e in Nebraska Raised the Price of Wheat.

ONE-FOURTH CENT UP AT THE CLOSE

Hot Winds Now with Prospect of a Reaction Caused Apprehension - Corn Slightly Lower and July Oats Higher-Stocks and Bonds.

CHICAGO, May 16 .- Wheat wound up firm and 'ac higher today after a new low price record. Weak cables and fair selling caused the opening easy feeling and reports of hot high winds in the west and the possibility of a cold wave were responsible for the later firmness. Corn closed ise lower; July outs 15c higher and provisions were little changed.

In wheat there was rather free selling at the start. Favorable crop news, with the exception of Nebraska and California, and the weak, depressing cables, were the principal factors in increasing the selling pressure. The rally later in the day was due to reports of hot weather in Nebraska, some advices reporting hot winds and the thermometer ninety degrees in the shade. The weather map showed colder conditions in the extreme northwest, with snow at the extreme horizon with apprehen-sion from the trade, fearing the cold wave might extend into the wheat belt. July opened %c lower at 56%c, lost %c and ad-vanced %c, closing at the top. Corn was weak early, but later firmed up the source of the source

Selling Movement Was Started Early and the Market Was Active All Day. NEW YORK, May 16,-The share specu

lation today was characterized by considerable activity, but the increased volume of business was due to the inauguration of a selling movement, which included

siderable activity, but the increased volume of business was due to the inauguration of a selling movement, which included Sugar, St. Paul, Burlington & Quincy and Chicago Gas, and in lesser degree others of the active shares. The pres-sure to sell was most pronounced in Sugar. There is a growing belief that the refining sugar interests will not receive that con-sideration of which they have claimed to be assured in the tariff bill if it should reach final passage. The situation in Washington is becoming more unsettled and the outlook is not so clear as it was a few weeks back for the Sugar people. The shares are, however, strongly sup-ported when attacked, and today after the selling movement started at the opening figures. The early decline was 2% per cent, then followed a reaction of 1% per cent and a final rally of ¼, making a decline on the day of 3% per cent. Sugar preferred lost 1 per cent. There were quite heavy sales of Bur-lington & Quincy in the first hour, despite the fact that it was generally admitted that the regular dividend would be declared, and a decline of 3% per cent was effected. St. Paul was even heavier than its sister stock and there were evi-dences of liquidation of the shares held by a bull pool, which hoped to find a mar-ket on the strength which it was hoped the Burlington dividend would impart to the dealings in the granger group. These expectations were not fulfilled and the price of St. Paul moved down on the large offerings made P4 per cent, with only 3 recovery at the close. Rock Island declined as and Northwestern stands unchanged compared with yesterday. Chicago Gas was sold down 1½ per cent during the morning, ralled 3½ in the afternoon and reacted 3% lossing 1 per cent on the day. A break of 2½ was made in National Lead on sales believed to be for the account of insiders, and the stock closed within 3% of t



with Cattle -Prices Forced Down. CHICAGO, May 16.-Today's cattle market was not comforting to sellers. Not only was it discouragingly dull, but it was weak to a degree. Eighteen thousand cattle is too big a supply for the slim demand, as shippers were made aware <text><text><text><text><text>



WEDNESDAY, May 16. Compared with receipts for the first half of last week the three day's supply shows a falling off of 700 cattle and 700 sheep, while the increase in hogs amount to over 5,000 head.

The supply of cattle today was just about up to the average, and as a runthe quality of the offerings was very good. Trade was brisk and prices strong on the handy light beeves, but slow and very dull on the heavier grades. Dressed beef men were all good buyers of the kind of cattle that suited them, that is the light and medium weights, and would pay more for good, fleshy steers weighing around 1,100 lbs. than for 1,400-lb. beeves. The demoralized condition of eastern and European markets dampened the ardor of shipping and export buyers, and sellers exprincipal export objects, and setters ex-perienced considerable difficulty in work-ing off cattle weighing from 1,200 lbs. up. Compared with neighboring markets the trade today was in very good shape, and long before noon the supply had changed bands

inde today was in very good shape, and long before noon the supply had changed hands. With less than a dozen loads of cows in the yards the trade presented no new features. Good, fat stock was in active demand and strong, while the under grades were no weaker than they have been re-cently. Most anything that the dressed beef men could use sold at \$3 or over. There was a light supply of calves, a good demand and a strong, active market. Rough stock of all kinds sold freely and at a shade better prices. The stocker and feeder market was rather active and generally prices ruled firm. Country buyers took hold more freely and the supply was pretty well cleaned up at the close.
