



SUPREME COURT SYLLABI.

Points Lowered in Decisions Rendered by the Judges at the Present Sitting. Following are the syllabi decisions handed down by the supreme court justices at the

present sitting: Clair vs The State of Nebraska. Error from Douglas county. Reversed. Opinion by Justice Post.

A wide discretion is allowed to the presiding judge in directing the attention of the grand jury to particular subjects of inquiry or to particular offenses or classes of offenses, and that discretion appellate courts will not assume to control.

2. But where a party indicted in the honest belief that he has been prejudiced by an abuse of discretion by the judge in his charge to the grand jury in respectful language alleges the action of the judge as error, in order to secure a ruling thereon, Clair vs The State of Nebraska. Error

by an abuse of discretion by the judge in his charge to the grand jury in respectful language alleges the action of the judge as error, in order to secure a ruling thereon, he is not guilty of contempt of court.

3. So held although he mistakes his remedy by assailing the charge of the judge by motion instead of by piea.

4. The existence of facts which will warrant the finding of an indictment is a question for the grand jury and should not as a rule be assumed by the judge.

5. A charge to the grand jury which, after assuming that the crime of bribery had been committed and that it was the duty of the jurors to indict therefor, concluded as follows: "There comes up from the people a command for a forward march all along the line of your duty. You should give heed to that cry, for it comes from a patient and long suffering endurance which has at last reached its limit." Held, that the term inflammatory as applied to said charge is a morited criticism.

Cobb vs The State of Nebraska. Error from Douglas county. Reversed. Opinion by Justice Post.

The questions presented by this case being in all respects identical with the case of Clair vs The State supra, it is, for reasons therein stated, reversed and remanded.

4. A judgment for a deficiency may be rendered against one who purchased the mortgaged property after the mortgage was made and in his purchase assumed and agreed to pay the mortgage debt. Cooper vs Foss, 15 Neb, 515, followed.

5. A mortgagee will not be precluded from obtaining a judgment for a deficiency upon the ground that he knowingly procured too great an amount to be found due upon the mortgage when in the proceedings for the deficiency judgment the finding of the amount due in the decree is mutually disregarded and a new accounting had.

6. In the absence of special equities a pledgee of personal property will not be required to exhaust his security before enforcing his personal remedy upon the debt.

7. A note and a mortgage securing it made contemporaneously are to be construed together. Therefore, where a note is payable

Therefore, where a note is payable on or before a date named and the mortgage contains a provision that in certain contingencies prior to that date the mortgage contains a provision that in certain contingencies prior to declare the whole amount due. Held: That such provision in the mortgage authorized the mortgagee upon the happening of such contingencies to proceed not only to foreclose the mortgage, but also to enforce the personal liability upon the note.

Where personal property is seized under an execution against a debtor who has neither lands, town lots or houses subject to exemption, and an inventory, under oath, is made and filed by such debtor as provided by section 522 of the code, it is the duty of the officer holding the writ to call appraisers to determine the value of the property, and the neglect or refusal of the officer to do so will not deprive the debtor of his exemption, but he may sue for the value of the property.

STONE OR MACADAM ROADS

Farmers of the County Differ as to Material to Be Used.

PROTESTS BEFORE THE COMMISSIONERS

Matter Will Be Further Considered at a Meeting Next Saturday-Prisoners Will No Longer Keep Court House Grounds in Order.

The county commissioners met in adjourned assion yesterday afternoon and approved the bonds of the lucky bidders for the paving of the country roads. Before the bonds were approved, however, the commissioners were favored with some ideas upon the question of material to be used in the construction of the three roads. George Redman and fifty-nine other prop-

erty owners from the country in the vicinity

of the Military road petitioned the board to reject the Colorado sandstone and use macadam in its stead. This was followed by a petition signed by thirty other property owners, all of whom wanted the commis-sioners to pave the road with the sandstone. Judge Bradley, in behalf of himself and a number of the farmers from the country sur-rounding Benson, appeared before the board and urged the commissioners to change the material from stone to macadam. He urged that if the commissioners would go out among the farmers of the northwestern portion of the county they would find that nine out of every ten favored macadam. The stone was good enough as far as it went, but the appropriation would lay but about two miles of pavement, while it would lay some seven miles of macadam. Mr. Bradley said that he could not see why the board would not give the people the kind of pave-ment for which they had petitioned. He said that he agreed with Commissioner Williams, who only one year ago went before the farmers of the county, and at their meetings read a paper advocating macadam as the proper material for use in paying country roads. Since that time, he said that Mr. Williams had become a strong adcate of stone and proposed to give the prople that material, whether they wanted it or not. There was no reason why the farmers should be punished by having a stone pave-ment when they could get one that they wanted. If macadam was not a success, the property owners and the farmers along the line of the road were willing to take the blame upon themselves and relieve the com-

missioners of all responsibility.

Commissioner Williams said that if macadam was laid under certain conditions then he was still an advocate of macadam, but the conditions provided for in the specifications were far from being such as he advo-cated in the paper read before the farmers'

meetings.

B. L. Snow of Benson was before the board representing thirty property owners who protested against macadam and petitioned in favor of stone. He said that he started with his petition only a short time before the convening of the board, and if he had taken a whole day he could have secured the signatures of hundreds of farmers who would have asked for stone. In fact, seventeen men out of every twenty, he said, were against macadam.

Robert W. Patrick, representing the interests of some of the property owners along the line of the Dodge street road, protested against the use of macadam. He said that he was willing to exchange with the people to the north, giving them the macadam and in return he would take the sandstone. He did not think that the macadam would last six months, and in the end he was of the opinion that it would prove a miserable failure. He thought that it would be just as well for the commissioners to take the \$50,000 and dump it into the river as to spend it in putting macadam upon the Dodge street road.

of discussing the road question. The cierk was instructed to inform the gentlemen that they could be heard next Saturday after-

By resolution it was decided that the \$150,000, the proceeds of the improvement bonds, should be expended equally on the three roads.

The committee on court house and jail was instructed to hire a man at \$40 per month, whose duties should be to keep the court house grounds in condition, thus doing away with the labor of county jail prisoners, who in the past have performed the yard work under the supervision of the

superintendent of the building.

A gang of laborers engaged in digging a sewer trench at Twenty-fourth and Lake strets came across a relic of early Omaha yesterday. They had reached a depth of several feet with their excavation when they ran against what they took for a large rock. They dug around it and found it to be about ten feet long and nearly half as much in breadth and depth.

Further investigation showed that it was not a single stone, but was composed of a number of large rocks solidly cemented together. No one was able to surmise for what purpose the stone had been put there until one of the old residents happened along and said that there was formerly a spring at the spot where the stone was found. When the street was laid out the rocks and cement were laid there to cover up the spring, and in that way the water had been forced to seek some other outlet. Every one had forgotten that the spring had ever existed until the discovery of the rock served as a reminder of the fact.
