# SHOWERS HELP THE CROPS

Drouth Broken in Many Sections and Farmers Correspondingly Encouraged.

RAIN STILL BADLY NEEDED IN THE STATE

The weekly crop report of the Nebraska weather service, co-operating with the United States weather bureau, issued by Director G. E. Hunt, for the week ended

June 4, says: The drouth has been partially broken by scattered local showers, and while crops in the localities visited by them have been greatly benefited the greater portion of the state is still suffering badly for rain. Wheat, oats and all small grains have been seriously if not hopelessly injured; meadows and pastures are drying up and fruit prospects are exceedingly poor. Corn is generally reported as doing fairly well. The acreage continues to be increased by farmers plowing up poor fields of wheat and oats and replanting in corn. # FAINTED IN THE COURT ROOM

Defendant in a Murder Case Falls to the Floor in a Swoon.

MRS. RUDIGER COMPLETELY PROSTRATED

Hearing of the Case Postponed Pending the Defendant's Recovery-Policeman Brings Suit for Witness Fees-Delt Akin's Damage Suit-Court Cullings.

The proceedings in the Rudiger trial, on for hearing in the criminal section of the district court, were given a somewhat sensational shock yesterday, and, as a result, the case went over until today, at which time, if the defendant is in a condition to withstand the mental and physical strain, the work of securing a jury will be resumed.

Monday night when court adjourned it was noticed that Eloise Rudiger, prisoner, appeared fatigued and worn out with the confinement of seven months in the county jail. In leaving the room she had to be assisted down the stairs and to the jail. After reaching that place and being locked in her cell she became deathly sick, but recovered to some extent during the night and yesterday when she started for the court room she was feeling much better

than for some days past.
At the usual hour the court convened and the examination of the jurors in the box was resumed, when suddenly and without any warning the prisoner fainted and was falling to the floor, when she was caught in the arms of the assistant jailer. The woman was carried into the private room of the judge, where she was revived, after which a messenger was dispatched for Dr. Tilden, who was appointed by Judge Scott to treat the case. After making an ex-amination the doctor stated that the woman was completely prostrated and that she would not be in a condition to appear at the trial again yesterday. This announcement having been made the jurors who were kept in the box were excused for the day and the

prisoner conducted back to the fail.

The fainting of the prisoner in the court room created a scene for a moment, as the room was filled with speciators, many of whom were women. Bailiff Williams, how-ever, was onto his job and promptly quelled everything that had the appearance of dis-

den sickness of Mrs. Rudiger said that it was the strongest card that she could have played and that it would do more toward securing her liberty than the testimony of a dozen witnesses. He did not think that she was feigning sickness, but he did think that becoming sick at the particular time was very opportune, if her interests were taken into consideration. At the time, he said, the room was full of jurors and that all of them were was fall of jurors and that all of them were witnesses to the proceedings, and while as a matter of fact, what occurred might not prejudice their minds, it would throw a great deal of sympathy into the balances, sympathy which no amount of testimony could remove

Injured on the Road,

John Niemeyer has sued James Stephenson in an action to recover the sum of \$25,000. alleged damages. They at once began to kick, and soon became unmanageable. The plaintiff alleges that he was thrown from the seat, in front of the wheels, which passed over his body, inflicting many

bruises and breaking a leg. Wasts Damages from the Motor. In the case of William Kirk against the Omaha Street Railway company, wherein the plaintiff sued to recover the sum of \$10,000 for alleged damages sustained, motion for indegen damages sustained, a motion for judgment by default was filed yesterday, the defendant having failed to answer or file any pleadings. In his peti-tion the plaintiff alleges that on Christmas day, 1891, he was riding from South Omaha to this city, occupying a seat on the guard rail at the rear of the trailer.
