OUTSIDE ORDERS WERE QUITE NUMEROUS

Early Bulge Was Attributed to the Stronger Cables and Bad Crop News from the Northwest - Stocks and Bonds.

CHICAGO, June 7 .- Wheat was feverish and irregular today, fluctuating frequently within 11/2c range and finishing with %c loss. Higher cables sent prices up, but the advance was met by free realizing. Corn closed %c lower, cats unchanged and provisions slightly higher all around.

In wheat there was a heavy trade, price changes being sharp and frequent. Outside orders were numerous and local traders operated on a large scale. There was heavy realizing by longs, and shorts covered freely. Opening trades were at from 14 to 1/20 advance, but seen sold off 1c, railied from % to 1c, eased off 114c, and closed easy. The early bulge was attributed to the stronger cables and bad crop news from the northwest, and the decline which followed due to free realizing. The second bulge was due to private cables from Paris quoting an ad-vance equal to 5c, and the price receded again when the public cubies were an-nounced. Another factor early was a cable from Berlin reporting the rye crop dam-aged and the market excited and higher. New York was said to be buying on fix cables and St. Louis also purchased freely on crop news from the southwest. But the local crowd was inclined to be bearish, and the market was unable to rally from the

last break, closing near the bottom.

NEW YORK, June 7 .- Share speculation on the Stock exchange opened up quite brisk this morning, and the trading was well distributed. The greatest business was done in the industrials, and of this group Sugar was again most active.

BEEF STEERS ARE IN GOOD DEMAND

Prices Rapidly Advancing on an Active Market-Cows and Stockers Follow-Hogs Open Weak, Raily and Close Firm at the Top.

THURSDAY, June 7. There was a light run of cattle today and no sheep, but a regular deluge of hogs. Receipts for the past four days show an increase over supplies for the corresponding four days last week of 1,000 cattle, 1,600 hogs and 500 sheep.

The cattle supplies were not at all heavy, and the offerings included some very desirable finished beeves. Conditions have long been against the producer, but it looks as if the turn in the lane had finally been reached. Prices have been on the up turn all week and today's advance puts cattle fully half a dollar higher than last week. Eastern markets were reported higher, and although the demand was confined almost entirely to the dressed beef men, competition was very brisk and the supply soon changed hands at prices strong to a dime higher than Wednesday. The top price was \$4.60 for a few head of choice 1,592 fb beeves, and stock had to be pretty poor to have to sell at under \$4.

There was very little change in the market for cows and mixed stock. Good to choice fat cows and heifers were in active demand at strong prices, while the common and in-ferior grades were more or less neglected, although not quotably lower. Calves and yearlings ruled dull and prices were generally a shade lower all around. Fat bulls, oxen and stags were in fair demand and firm, while rough thin stock was slow and a

shade lower.

In stockers and feeders a fair amount of business was transacted. Yard traders' supplies are very limited at present and the fresh receipts are about equal to the country demand. Prices were quotably unchanged, but the feeling was firm on all sides, and with a little encouragement in the shape of shade lower. with a little encouragement in the shape of good rains prices would in all probability advance. 


