ABUNDANT RAINS THROUGHOUT THE STATE

ndition of Small Grain Greatly Improved by the Rains Even where They Were Thought to Be Beyond Redemption-Harvesting Under Way.

The drouth has at last been thoroughly broken in all portions of the state. In the southeast section the amount of rain was even greater than was needed, in some localities retarding the cultivation of corn and delaying harvesting. The prospects for a great corn crop were perhaps never better in the state at this wason of the year. One of the most gratifying features of the reports this week is the decided improvement noted in wheat and oats, crops that were thought to have been hopelessly ruined by the drouth. Harvesting has already commenced and the yield promises to be larger than was thought possible two weeks ago.

NORTHEAST SECTION. Antelope County-Local rains have made the prospects good for corn; small grain will not make over half crop; pastures need

Boyd County-Week has been warm and dry except light shower on 19th; corn shows no signs of suffering, but is making rapid growth.

Abundant Rains Have Fallen Throughout the Great Corn Belt. WASHINGTON, June 28.—The weather ureau, in its review of weather conditions, says: The week ending June 25 has been much warmer than usual in the northern states east of the Rockies to Missouri,

The week was cool in all states west of the Rocky mountains. In California the cool weather retarded the ripening of fruit cool weather retarded the ripening of fruit and some injury to growing crops resulted from high winds. During the past week the rainfall has been in excess over Kansas and Nebraska. Timely rains also occurred in North Dakota and the northern portions of Minnesota. The rainfall was very light in the southern portions of Missouri and Illinois, where growing crops are much in need of rain. Throughout the principal corn states the weather was especially favorable. The threatened drouth has been followed up by generous rains, which leave this crop in promising condition.

Rain Still Needed in Central Iowa-DES MOINES, June 26 .- The Iowa crop oulletin says: The drouth is practically broken in all parts of the state, though in the central district more rain is needed to revive pastures and replenish the water sup-Corn was never cleaner or more promply. Corn was never cleaner or more prom-ising in the last week of June. The stand is remarkably even, and in the larger part of the state it is about ready to "lay by." Oats have headed with short straw, and the heads are generally deficient in number of grains. The quality of the yield is likely to be greater than in recent years. The harvest of winter wheat and rye is in progress in southern districts with fair yields. Barley harvest will begin a week earlier

than usual, the crop about two-thirds aver-South Dakota Crops.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., June 26.—(Special to The Bec.)—Reports of copious rains to The Bee.)—Reports of copious rains from Clark, Beadle, Miner, Bonhomme, Lake, Hanson, Kingsbury, Hand, Yankton and Lincoln counties are received here with rejoicing, in twith sta dir g the fact that Minnehaha county has not had her share of moisture, although she baid \$290 to have Rainmaker Jewell in town for five days. SCOTT AGAIN TURNED DOWN. Mandamus Issued to Correct One of the Judie al Czar's Usurpations. Yesterday Judge Scott was pretty sharply turned down by the supreme court. In 1891 Edward Hargesheimer was convicted of forgery in the Douglas county and sentenced by Judge Estelle to four years in the penitentiary. An appeal was taken to the supreme court, on the refusal of Judge Estelle to grant a new trial, and Hargesheimer was released on bonds, pending a review of his case by the higher tribunal.

In April last the supreme court affirmed the decision of the district court and the sheriff was instructed to see that the sentence was put in effect. Sheriff Drexel had placed Hargeshelmer in jail, preparatory to aking him to Lincoln, when an attorney ployed in the prisoner's behalf placed before Judge Scott a bunch of affidavits purporting to show that the prisoner was insane. Judge Scott, disregarding the mandate of the supreme court and ignoring the exclusive juris-diction of the insanity commission in such adjudged Hargesheimer insane granted a new trial and released him on bonds to appear on the first day of the Sep-tember term of court. County Attorney Kaley objected to such procedure, but his objections were promptly overruled by Scott. Yesterday the attention of the supreme court was called to the matter by Assistant Attorney General Summers, whereupon a peremptory writ of mandamus was issued ordering Sheriff Drexel to at once carry out the judgment of the lower court in the first
