New Laws Which Go Into Effect on the First of the Month.

HARD ON THE PROFESSIONAL JURYMAN

Sheriff's Office Will Not Be So Fat from Now On-Penalty Provided for Performing Any Election Work for Pay-Women Can Vote at Hond Elections.

Wednesday, July 4, is the day set for a large number of laws that were passed by the last legislature to go into force. Among others is a law that will work quite a revolution in the matter of professional Jurors, the class which have caused so much mental anguish to attorneys. The new law provides that the name of every voter not exempted from jury service shall be put into a box and the jurymen shall be selected from the whole city or county, as the case may be, instead of from the "chestnuts" who happen to have friends on the election board, as is often the case now. Any additions to the regular panel are drawn in the same way, from the box, instead of from among the loafers about the court room. The new law will probably do away with the job of the professional juror en-

Another law is that with reference to the compensation of sheriffs and justices of the peace. Sheriffs in counties of less than 28,000 inhabitant, receive the same fees as under the old law. In countles with less than 45,000 and more than 28,000 the sheriff cannot retain more than \$2,300, and in counties of more than 45,000 not more than \$3,000.

Justices cannot receive more than \$1,500 and constables \$1,500 a year.

Women may hereafter vote at all elections held in any city, incorporated town or school district for the purpose of issuing bonds for municipal or school purposes, for bor-

rowing money or increasing the tax levy.

Two laws also go into effect which it may bother the authorities somewhat to enforce. One of them provides that the making of an agreement to pay money to induce persons to refrain from voting, or to perform any service on election day in the interest of any candidate or the interest of any political party shall be a misdemeanor, and subjects both parties to the agreement to a fine of not less than \$50, or imprisonment not exceeding ninety days. The other law prohibits selling or giving to any per-son under 16 years of age cigarettes or tobacco in any form, excepting by the written order of the parent or guardian. The pen-alty is a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100.




