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NEWS FROM COUNCIL BLUFFS

New Laws Which Go Into Effect on the First of the Month.

HARD ON THE PROFESSIONAL JURYMEN

Sheriff's Office Will Not Be So Fat From Now On—Penalty Provided for Performing Any Election Work for Pay—Women Can Vote at Bond Elections.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 4, IS THE DAY SET FOR A LARGE NUMBER OF LAWS THAT WERE PASSED BY THE LAST LEGISLATURE TO GO INTO FORCE.

Among others is a law that will work quite a revolution in the matter of professional jurors, the class which have caused so much mental anguish to attorneys. The new law provides that the names of every voter not exempted from jury service shall be put into a box and the names shall be selected from the whole city or county, as the case may be, instead of from the "chestnuts" who happen to have friends on the election board, as is often the case now.

Any additions to the regular panel are drawn in the same way, from the box, instead of from among the loafers about the court room. The new law will probably do away with the job of the professional juror entirely.

Another law is that with reference to the compensation of sheriffs and justices of the peace, which is to be reduced to less than 25,000 inhabitants receive the same fees as under the old law. In counties with less than 45,000 and more than 25,000 the sheriff cannot receive more than \$2,500, and in counties of more than 45,000 not more than \$3,000. Justices cannot receive more than \$1,500 and constables \$100 a year.

Women may hereafter vote at all elections held in any city, incorporated town or school district for the purpose of issuing bonds for municipal or school purposes, for borrowing money or increasing the tax levy.

Two laws also go into effect which will make both the authorities somewhat to enforce. One of them provides that the making of an agreement to pay money to induce persons to refrain from voting, or to perform any service on election day in the interest of any candidate or party, or any political party shall be a misdemeanor, and subjects both parties to the agreement to a fine of not less than \$50, or imprisonment not exceeding ninety days. The other law prohibits selling or giving to any person under 16 years of age cigarettes or tobacco in any form, excepting by the written order of the parent or guardian. The penalty is a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100.

A circular is being sent out by State Dairy Commissioner Boardman to all milk dealers notifying them that their permits to carry on their business expires on July 4, and they must apply for new permits if they expect to continue their business, if they are located in towns with more than 10,000 inhabitants.
