

deralling of the train, and their comrades at the depot predict that they will do severly with any of the strikers they may encounter. The regulars can be heard discussing the affair on all sides, and it is evident from their conversation that they are eager for an engagement with that enemy. They say they came here to do fair fighting and that they do not propose to submit to that kind of treatment.

An examination of the bridge revealed the fact that one of the stringers had been cut off and a small piece of wood substituted in such a way that it would fall through as soon as a heavy weight passed over the rail. Two men have been arrested on suspicion of having been concerned in the wreck. They are now in the guardhouse. They were arrested near the scene of the accident by a deputy marshal. Engineer McCoy, who was on the train, saw the men just before the train left the track and pointed them out to the officers. They were heavily armed when arrested.

The depot has been cleared and a picket line now surrounds the depot at a distance of about a block in all directions. There have been rumors of dynamite buried in the depot and it is to avoid all danger of explosion that the depot is guarded.

The city is practically under martial law. Marshal Baldwin this afternoon issued a proclamation notifying all persons that the troops were in the city and that the orders of the commanding general would be enforced. He also cautions them against all unlawful assemblies.

Sheriff O'Neill tonight arrested S. D. Warden on suspicion of being implicated in the derailing of the train. Warden is well known in this city. He has been quite prominent in labor circles and was recently sent as a delegate to the Chicago convention of railway men. The sheriff has also arrested A. G. Greenwald, William Burn and H. E. Bodner, alleged strikers, for complicity in the wrecking of the train. They will be held pending an investigation.

GAVE IT UP FOR THE DAY.

His One Thousand Men Offer Jumped on by Central Labor Union.

Omaha Central Labor union held a regular meeting last night in Patterson's hall, with a large attendance of delegates and visitors, at which considerable business of a public nature was transacted. President John B. Schupp called the meeting to order and Fred O. Dean of Typographical union No. 199, was appointed assistant secretary.

The secretary announced that delegates asking admission were in waiting to be admitted. Workers assembly No. 362 presented H. R. Bowman; Magic City Federation, P. Hogan, F. A. Martin, J. M. Murphy, J. J. Murphy and E. F. Haley; Machinists Union No. 21, Charles F. Seaman, who were all accepted and given the usual obligation.

The special committee appointed at the last regular meeting to receive the Hegar report recommended that the committee be reorganized, as after "hard sailing" Mayor Bemis was especially commended for his action in assisting the Commanding army, also proprietors of the Co-Operative hotel. The remainder of the report was in line with the regular news published here.

The new committee to report was the special committee appointed to map out a plan for forming labor military companies.

First of all the committee recommended that Omaha's organized labor do organize military companies. The committee also recommended that one be sent to the central body and that a committee of four be chosen to visit the various labor organizations in the city and explain the methods of military organization to be followed by the Central Labor Union. Federal tactics were adopted and it is the expectation of the committee that several hundred will be enrolled within a few days.

The companies will be organized into battalies, which will form a nucleus for filing up to 100 at any time there may be a necessity for so doing. The members will be starting out organized with the laws of Nebraska governing the organization of military companies and all of the members are opposed to lawlessness in any shape or form whatever.

They propose that the companies shall become well drilled, so that they may be an aid in preserving peace when properly called out.

The leaders say that the companies will drill about twice each week until they become proficient and that they will not come under the control of the state authorities until they are well drilled and could be of some service.

Ernest Longbaugh was elected as recruiting officer, and Alfred Fawker and F. O. Dean aides. These three, with J. W. Vogan, constitute the committee.

The law committee reported the settlement of the trouble between the Freeport brewing company and O'Conor's Union No. 16 and that thereafter the brewing company would use only uniformed cooperation.

SCORED OLNEY AND SEAVEY.

The union then took up the consideration of the letter purporting to have been sent by Chief of Police Seavey to the chief of police of Chicago and also his action.

It was said that the chief of police of Omaha sent his detectives to try to land the Hogan army on the Iowa side and that the Central Labor union succeeded in landing the army on the Omaha side, where there was no resistance.

A committee of three was appointed to draw up resolutions expressing the sentiment of the union on this and other matters.

The committee reported the following resolutions, which were adopted as the sense of the union:

Whereas, Grover Cleveland, president of the United States, has at the head of the law department of the nation a man who is now a director of the Chicago Burlington and Quincy railroad, and who is known to his appointment as attorney general, attorney for said railroad company, and as Attorney General of the U. S. & railroad director, that he should be removed from the militia at Bismarck this afternoon, as he was injured. Two companies of recruits have been sent to Chicago to reinforce the militia. The workers at Whiting are determined and well armed. They cannot be easily put down this morning from the Standard oil strike, and are said to be for oil stills and it stands ready for action. Besides this numerous drills and revolvers and 3000 rounds of ammunition have been procured.

FIRST PORTLAND TRAIN FOR A MONTH.

SALT LAKE, July 11.—Four companies of the Sixteenth regiment at Fort Douglas were held under arms to go out on the Southern Pacific road to meet the train.

A few hundred people gathered at the depot were dispersed by the men. At the wharves a detachment of state militia had been placed guard the water front.

The regular troops were held in readiness. No effort was made to restrain the men, who were concealed in the bushes on the opposite side of the river. The militia were held in reserve and 200 shots were exchanged across the river, but the attacking party fled. A Japanese boy, who stood on the river bank, was killed by a bullet from the militiamen. None of the attacking party were apprehended. After this skirmish it was reported hostilities had ended.

FIRST TRAIN WAS BROKEN.

Under cover of the United States troops the railroad officials went into the yards and resumed work unopposed. The tracks were cleared and trains were made up. At noon a train was dispatched for Oakland under a strong military guard.

Among the crowds in the streets there were many who were sure the trains would never reach Oakland, but no one thought they spoke knowingly. An hour later when the news came back to Sacramento of a horrible railroad wreck in which at least ten men had perished, these same men, who had been sure the men were strikers who had saved away the main parts of the railroad bridge. The disaster at the bridge caused the railroad company to cease its efforts to move trains out of Sacramento. Until the workers were at work, shall we say, the railroad company did not care whether no trains can be run over that line, but whether the company will try to run other trains out of Sacramento tomorrow remains to be seen.

At Oakland today the outlook was also with the extra help of the special policemen and deputies had been added. The railroad officials were making preparations early in the day to start trains simultaneously with those sent out from Sacramento. The strikers resolved to "kill" the locomotives and turn them up.

Before the fall of Seguin had arrived a band of strikers charged into the yards on the mole. They were repelled. They waited for reinforcements from the Alameda.

When more men arrived the strikers charged again, but this time the engines had run and were killed the strikers withdrew. Then came news of the disaster over Sacramento. When District Superintendent Wilder heard that the men had been wrecked he stepped all the way to the locomotive.

"We know where we stand," said he. "Before we go ahead, if you're thinking in now to prevent us, do not propose to send your men out and jeopardize our men."

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
