The July Century contains a suggestive essay by John C. Van Dyke on "Painting at the Fair," with reproductions of pictures by Liljefors, Israels, Winslow Homer and Agnes Steineger. In the comparison of national art the writer finds that the World's fair shows the greatest promise to be with the Americans and Scandinavians. Marion Crawford contributes a delightful novelette entitled "Love in Idleness: A Fortnight at Bar Harbor." The characters are New York people, and some very delectable love making is introduced in the beginning. Mrs Burton Harrison's story, "A Bachelor Maid," with drawings by Wiles, onens in New York City and deals with the pens in New York City and deals with the aspirations of a young man to whom the what irk ome. The stery deals incidentally with some of the current questions in regard to the relations of women to society nd public life. The Century Company, "A Traveler from Altruria," by W. D.

Howells, which had previously reached the public in serial form, is now out complete in a neatly printed volume. The story of the Altrurian's experiences and converations comprise a series of agreeable chats touching the merits and demerits of social system, particularly as compared with that of Altruria, which is communistic in its organization. A bright vein of satire runs through the pages, and a great numruns through the pages, and a great number of clever arguments and comparisons are brought forward. "Why don't some of you capitalists take hold of farming here in the east and make a business of it as they do in the west?" asks one of the characters. "Thank you," says the other, "If you mean me. I would rather not invest." Later he continues: "It may come to something like that though If it does to something like that, though. The essays included in this collection are well arranged to fit in with one another so that together they give a tolerably complete view of all the departments of city government in Philadelphia. The historial parts are particularly interesting and evince in are particularly interesting and evince in nearly every instance painstaking research and careful compilation. The one drawback in a work so subdivided as this is that any particular process of municipal administration requiring the co-operation of several city officials must be described in in-stallments, but this is remedied so far as may be by an elaborate index at the end of the volume. It is greatly to be wished that similar studies may be prepared of the city governments of other American cities, thus supplying the necessary data for a comprehensive work by some ex-perienced investigator upon comparative municipal administration of cities in the United States, if not in the leading countries

Lord Coleridge quietly opened his eyes and inquired in his blandest manner, "Yes, Mr. Robinson. What else did the defendant say besides, "Oh, — it?"
