A sense of public duty compels me to return ordinance No. 581, entitled an act to amend ordinance No. 71, regulating and prescribing the duties of the garbage master of South Omaha. In regulating such matters under the police power of the city, I assume that the ordinance should protect all citizens equally who seek to avail themselves of the privileges conferred by the act. The municipality owes full protection to all legitimate business enterprises. I find no warrant in the charter which gives to the executive any power to depart from this safe rule of action. All citizens stand equal before the law. Inasmuch as the ordinance in express terms excludes all such dead animals as may hereafter be hauled from the union stock yards, I regard such exception as an uniawful discrimination and an invasion of the personal rights of the citizens. For this reason only I am constrained to interpose the executive veto, and most respectfully return the ordinance to your honorable body without my official sanction.
